Create Judicial District

On Thursday the board of county commissioners voted to create a new judicial district in Stevens county, to be called district No. 2, with headquarters at Newport. Three towns desired to be the headquarters for a new district, Hunters with a petition signed by 100 citizens, Usk with a petition signed by 240, and Newport with a petition signed by 356. Newport was given the preference over the other places, Commissioner Sutherland casting his two votes in favor of Newport, where he lives, and Commissioner Beggs voting against the proposition. The creation of the new district will be in effect upon the assent and signature of Judge D. H. Carey.

At a meeting of the Stevens County Horticultural Society held at Kettle Falls Wednesday A. F. Crowell of Spokane, former fruit inspector of that county, was endorsed for the position of fruit inspector for this county. Under the new law the commissioners only have power to appoint assistants, the state commissioner of horticulture appointing all inspectors for the state. F. A. Huntley of Tacoma, state commissioner, has agreed to appoint whomever should be selected by the county society. This county is now in district No. 10, comprising Stevens and Ferry counties.

Mrs. Mary A. Murray sold her fine farm of 160 acres on Narcisse creek this week to Milton Robinson, who intends to set out a large orchard on the place. The deal was made through the Alrite Realty Company.

Last Sunday at high noon occurred the marriage of Miss Mae Cameron to Otto Adams of Greenacres, near Spokane, conducted by Rev. G. H. Wilbur. The bride is a daughter of Mrs. M. A. Cameron. She is a graduate of the Cheney normal school and has taught in the Colville schools for the last two years. The groom is a horticulturist, a graduate of Pullman and a former student at Cheney, where he first met the bride. They left on the afternoon train for their home at Greenacres, carrying with them a host of well wishes, together with a considerable quantity of rice and other little tokens of congratulations.


