The bank's fire department was brought into successful action and the blaze did no damage beyond burning the awning. The southbound morning passenger last Saturday ran into a burning bridge this side of Hill-yard, and when the train was midway over the bridge the timbers gave way, dragging the train into the creek. The w e caught fire and the entire train was burned, nothing being saved but one sack of registered mail. Only the fireman and engineer were in any way injured, and they not seriously. A slight curve prevented the engineer from seeing the condition of the bridge ahead. The northbound morning passenger was annulled, and no mail was received from the south until late Saturday evening.
