Cashier W. R. Baker of the Bank of Colville, who is grand master of Masons of Washington, returned Wednesday from a two weeks' trip over the state. Most of his time was spent in looking after the lodge work. He visited nine lodges, and in Seattle was tendered a dinner by the masters and past master of that city. At Walla Walla he was entertained at the home of Senator Ankeny, who has been a leading member of the grand lodge for years. At North Yakima the Masons are preparing to build a \$180,000 temple. Mr. Baker states that he is impressed with the strength and general prosperity of the order in all sections of the state. He was accompanied during a part of his trip by Past Grand Master Atkins. Mrs. Baker and son Ray visited at her former home in Coupeville, and at Seattle and Spokane, returning with Mr. Baker Wednesday.

The \$20 bounty on cougars has been the cause of bringing in many animals this winter. The bounty on cougars was greatly increased by the last legislature, mainly through the efforts of residents of Stevens county. More than a year ago R. J. Townsend and A. J. Lee were out hunting and chanced upon the half-devoured bodies of a number of deer in a ravine. Reports from all parts of the county had shown that the cougar killed more deer than all the sportsmen in this section, and these gentlemen decided to start a petition for an increase on the cougar bounty. A petition was circulated by them and forwarded to Representative R. A. Thayer, who personally appeared before the legislative committee and saw that the bill was reported in the exact terms as petitioned. The legislature reduced the cougar bounty from \$25 to \$20, and the coyote bounty from \$2.50 to \$1, but otherwise the bill passed as was requested from this county. The good effect of the measure has already been seen here, and before the winter is over a number of the big animals will show up in the auditor's office in a condition too much dead to cause further trouble. Many cougars are reported in the upper Pend Oreille section and on Black-tail mountain.
