When Conductor Getsey of the S. F. & N. took his train out of Spokane last Tuesday morning, he found that he had in the smoker a very noisy bunch of passengers. These passengers who were in route for Oroville had evidently been imbibing too freely, and in spite of the efforts of the conductor and his crew to keep them quiet the noise increased.
