

### John L. Wilson Rally

The senatorial campaign in Stevens county was opened here Wednesday night by John L. Wilson of Seattle, who has served this state in congress for 10 years, and now desires to be sent to the senate to succeed Senator Piles.

Wilson is well known to the old-timers of this section, and was met at the train by a large delegation of the leading republicans, not only of Colville, but of various parts of the county. The afternoon was spent in renewing acquaintanceships, his first visit being to the office of Hon. Jacob Stitzel, an especially warm friend of former days. You know the headquarters of "Uncle Jake" comes pretty near being headquarters for the republican party in this vicinity, and many visitors were received and introduced to Wilson at the office.

His appearance at the skating rink in the evening was greeted by a crowded house, and his remarks received much applause, especially regarding his stand on the question of conservation.



State control of state resources is his platform. "Let the agricultural land of this state be opened to homestead entry, let the water power of the state be leased and not sold, let the logged-off lands be reforested wherever the land is not suitable for agricultural purposes, and let the riches which belong to this state be conserved for the children of those who have made this state, and not for the people of the east who take no interest in us other than that what they can get out of us."

This is the vital difference between the belief of Wilson and that of the insurgents and Poin-dexter, his opponent for senatorial nomination. The insurgents, Pinchot, and his kind, would keep our lands bottled up for the benefit of the nation at large, making the people of this state pay big taxes to keep up the state government while the federal government keeps our lands from settlement.

"If this water power is to be leased, I very strongly favor the leasing by the state of Washington, and if any benefits are to inure to anybody from these leases let it be the taxpayer of this state and not the federal treasury for the benefit of other states that have already secured their share of these water powers for their own separate and individual benefit. In the final analysis, the state of Washington owns the flowing water and the beds of the streams. The federal government has proprietorship in the abutting land. This is our water power and its benefits belong to us. I believe that the state's control of these water powers is likely to bring the swiftest development. Water power is indestructible. It is as good 1000 years from now as it is today. So long as the sun shines water power will exist. Its use means the conservation of our coal and wood. I stand for a fair, reasonable, honest conservation, but I do not stand for our eastern friends attempting to get a share of something

that does not belong to them."

Wilson has undoubtedly done a great deal for this state, and like Tom Carter of Montana is a man who can actually "get things" for his people. In fact, he has done it, and wants to do it again. He does not deal with factional differences, but has been a lifelong republican, as was his father.

He states that he wants the senatorial nomination, but if he should not happen to get it, the work he is doing along the line of opening up our state resources will well repay his efforts in this campaign. He has a host of strong friends in this section who are doing all they can for him, and the present status of the county seems to show that he will lead in the vote.

### Letter From Fire Warden

J. R. Welty, fire warden, who was here two weeks ago to look into the matter of the heavy fires which had visited this section, writes to Commissioner S. S. Beggs as follows, and his words should be carefully considered by the residents of this county:

We are having a lot of timber fires in Stevens county, and it is evident to my mind that these fires, or most of them, are being maliciously set. The laws have never been enforced there in respect to setting fires and leaving them to spread and destroy property. If the better class of citizens who are interested in the future welfare and development of Stevens county would interest themselves and take some organized action toward putting a stop to the indiscriminate setting of timber fires and land a few of these fire bugs in jail, it would have the effect of stopping this villainous business, to a large extent, and would aid in saving one of the most valuable resources of the county. If we can't enforce the law, and every irresponsible cuss can set out a timber fire when he feels disposed to do so and go unpunished, the valuable timber of your county, and likely much other property, will be destroyed in spite of the efforts of the state's forest fire patrol.

If we shall be able to protect the timber from the ravages of fire we must have the moral aid of the better and law abiding class of people with us. We must have this moral aid in tangible form so that it will create a strong public sentiment against willful violation of the law.

The man who willfully sets out a timber fire at this extremely dry season is a criminal of the worst type. He is not only endangers or destroys the timber, but he endangers the lives and homes of hundreds of people. Will the people of Stevens county who believe in law and order assist us in apprehending criminals of this class, or will they feel themselves justified in sitting complacently down and allowing this thing to continue? Will they content themselves by calling on the state's patrol to handle the situation unaided? One of these miscreants can set out more fire than can be gotten under control and extinguished by a thousand men. We are putting forth a most strenuous effort to control the many timber fires in your county, as you well know, but if we can not receive at least the moral support of the better element, our efforts may not avail.

I just returned from the timber fire on the south fork of Mill creek, in your county, where I spent a week in charge, and then came down to Clayton, where there was a fire. We arrested the man who set the fire there, D. C. Neafus. He had his trial before Justice Nevill, who fined him \$99 and costs. I put W. H. Clinton on to assist the deputy fire warden in the work, and also put a man on at Blueslide and Cusick. It seems that they will be able to cope with the situation. The question of money with which to continue the work is the thing that is confronting us just now. At the present rate of expenditure, the money I have left of the appropriation will be gone in 20 days from this time. As the law makes it a crime for an officer to create a deficiency, when the money is expended that now remains, I will have to suspend work.

This would be exceedingly unfortunate, and I hope that we can continue the work to the end of the season.

I have asked the deputy fire warden of Spokane county to take charge of any fires in the south end of Stevens county, as he has not a very large timber area in his county.

There should be some organized effort of all the timber owners and every farmer and settler who has any timber land, and also every person who realizes the value of the timber resources of the county, to protect the timber from fire.

I made an effort to this end last winter. Tried to get the organization to cover the counties of Stevens, Spokane and Ferry.

I shall make another effort after the strenuous work of the fire season is over, and think it will succeed. If we

can succeed in getting all these people organized it will create a united sentiment that will go a long way in preventing the indiscriminate setting out of fires. When the time comes, I will ask you and the other members of the board to render some assistance in its formation.

Wire me in regard to any information you have of fires at any time.
