E. F. Cartier Van Dissel, president of the Phoenix Lumber Company and a second vice president and chairman of the board of trustees of the National Apple Show, reported at the last quarterly meeting of the Western Pine Manufacturer's Association that 50,000,000 feet of pine lumber, or sufficient to build 5,000 5-room cottages, was used to provide boxes for the apples grown in the Inland Empire this season. He also submitted estimates prepared by growers and handlers, showing that not less than 300,000,000 feet of lumber will be needed to supply the demand for boxes in five years. These estimates place the fruit crop of the district, taking in parts of eastern Washington and Oregon, north and central Idaho, western Montana and northeastern British Columbia, at 100,000 cars. Five feet of lumber is used in making a standard apple box, which holds a little more than a Winchester bushel. Mr. Van Dissel says the bulk of the boxes will be used in packing apples for eastern markets.
