### THE LOCAL NEWS

J. M. Hardesty will open a new store first door south of the Rickard Bazaar in a few days. Mr. Hardesty will carry a complete line of queensware, crockery, glass and silverware.

Mrs. Rosa Palmer will reopen her kindergarten school on Sept. 11 at the Flint residence at 679 N. Maple St. Mrs. Palmer is a graduate of the Chicago kindergarten College and has had experience in teaching.

Prof. A. M. Daily of the Colville schools of 18 years ago has been visiting some of the boys and girls who are now men and women of families during the past week. At that time Mr. Daily and Miss Eva Jones constituted the corps of teachers in the Colville schools, while the father of the schoolmaster did all the preaching within a radius of 50 miles. According to the Daily Bulletin Mr. Daily is reported as having made the statement that in those days Hooker, now Oak street, was the main business street of the city. In this the Bulletin is mistaken. In 1893 there was not a business house on Hooker street, and between Adiah and Still streets there was but one house and two small shacks.

George Berry, a well known farmer living near Bluecreek, was found by neighbors Sunday in an unconscious condition lying in the field. The stricken man was taken to the Colville sanitarium for treatment. On examination by physicians it was found that Mr. Berry was suffering from a severe paralytic stroke, caused from a heavy blow on the right temple. Whether this blow came from the hands of a would-be assassin, or was an accident, is as yet unknown. The neighbors in the vicinity of Bluecreek state that as far as can be learned Mr. Berry had no enemies, and had lived in the community for the past 18 years. He was in a subconscious condition throughout the week, and died Thursday night. His age was 68. He came from Scranton, Pa., in the early '80s to Spokane county, and in 1893 settled at Bluecreek. He was a bachelor, with relatives in Spokane and Ferry counties. He was an early friend of W. H. Graham and the land on which he lived was given him by Mr. Graham. Funeral services will be held at Addy tomorrow at 3.

An auto party consisting of Mr. and Mrs. J. Milligan and Mr. and Mrs. A. Eastman passed through Colville on Monday enroute for their home in Vernon, B. C. Mr. Milligan is a retired business man, while Mr. Eastman is the proprietor and owner of the Hotel Vernon. The party left Vernon two weeks ago in a Maxwell touring car for a 1000 mile trip through the Inland Empire. They all expressed themselves as favorably impressed with the great wheat belt in the Big Bend and the Palouse country, as well as the Colville valley and the city of Colville. Barring a serious accident at Deer Park where the chauffeur ran the big car into a tree, damaging the machine to the extent of \$400, the entire outing was a most enjoyable trip.

E. M. Allen, attorney, until recently a resident of Spokane, with his wife and family removed to Colville this week and will make this city their future home. Mr. Allen is a young man with a wide experience in the practice of the law and will give his entire attention to professional work. He will have offices with Attorney John B. Slater, with whom he has formed a co-partnership. Mr. Allen with his wife and two children are domiciled in the bungalow at the north end of Main street.

Charles E. Grass, the Russian nobleman who for several months led a life of luxury and idleness in and around Colville, has suddenly disappeared. Mr. Grass represented himself as being from an aristocratic and very wealthy Russian family, and exhibited a number of diplomas showing that he was a graduate in civil, mechanical and marine engineering. He often told of the fabulous fortune that he was about to possess and showed a number of cablegrams to verify his statements. Following out this mode of procedure the accomplished and high bred foreigner made many friends who were all willing and ready to loan him small sums of money or sign bankable paper with him for a short loan. After the field had been well worked in this section, Mr. Grass began similar operations in Spokane and after issuing about \$500 in bogus checks and other spurious paper left for parts unknown. Mr. Grass left about twenty creditors in Colville who claim an aggregate shortage of about \$750.
