The heirs of the Shively estate and James Monaghan have come to an agreement to arbitrate the matter of the land which was bought by Monaghan several years ago, supposedly from Shively. It is believed by many that James F. Logan, who broke his neck at Walla Walla through the assistance of the state of Washington last spring, was the man who killed Shively, forged a deed to himself for Shively's land, sold the land to Monaghan, and kept the proceeds. The heirs of Shively claim that the land having been fraudulently sold, should belong to them now, and an effort has been made to recover the land.
