## COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

In the case of the state vs. Everett Goakey, which was tried last week Friday and Saturday, the jury rendered a verdict of "guilty as charged" about 4 o'clock Sunday morning, having deliberated over the case nearly eight hours. The defendant is a rancher in the Rice country, and is accused of statutory offense, the complaining witness being his niece.

Henry Russell returned to Colville last Saturday from his ranch in Okanogan county, where he went a couple of weeks ago. Upon his arrival there he found his house had been destroyed by fire and the contents removed for use by the incendiary. His suspicions were directed to the man who had jumped his claim. A search warrant was sworn out and the goods recovered. The man was arrested and gave bond. He pleaded guilty, his reason for taking the property being that he supposed the owner had abandoned the place, and says he burned the house in order to plow the ground.

The southbound passenger train Sunday was wrecked a short distance north of the station at Orin. Two passengers were injured and brought to Colville and placed in the General hospital. Deputy Sheriff H. M. Dorman was telephoned to notify a couple of doctors, and he succeeded in getting Dr. I. S. Clark and Dr. J. W. Henderson. The deputy and doctors left immediately in their cars and the doctors returned with the sick men. The injured ones are W. F. Lehrke of Clayton, a petit jurymen, and Victor Belchin, who has been working in the mines in British Columbia. His home is in West Virginia. The injuries are not serious, but the patients will necessarily be laid up a short time. The wreck was caused by the train jumping the track. The train ran for a short distance on the ties and then plowed into the ground. A work train came down from Marcus with a derrick and a track was laid around the wrecked train. A relief train was sent up from Spokane for the passengers from the disabled train.

Last Saturday the grand jury returned a report of two indictments of "true bills" against D. H. Kimple. The trouble is over a misunderstanding about some brick. Mr. Kimple gave bond.

In the bootlegging case of the state vs. Ross Johnson, heard before Judge E. H. Sullivan on Tuesday, the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty," having been shut up but a few minutes. Thirteen witnesses were subpoenaed in this case. The defendant was formerly station agent at Loon Lake. Attorneys Jesseph & Bourland defended Johnson.

John Merchand of the South Half, who was indicted by the grand jury for manslaughter, furnished a thousand dollar bond Wednesday and was released from the custody of the sheriff.

L. S. Harbison, game warden, returned Tuesday from Chewelah, where he had been looking after the bunch of 12 elk which are in a park of 15 acres. The elk will be turned loose in the woods as soon as the calving season is over, which will be next month. Mr. Harbison is now in the southern part of the county, where he is scattering trout fry in all the lakes and streams along the line. The first of next week he will make a trip north for the purpose of planting the spring hatch. The number of little fish in this hatch is 350,000.

C. J. Rhodes, fish warden, returned Sunday from the Pend Oreille lakes, where he had been for about six weeks getting spawn.

A summons and complaint was filed Monday by Hugh Waddell, as guardian of the person and estate of Susan McClung, an incompetent, against George A. Morley and Mildred V. Morley and others to foreclose a mortgage.

There will be a dance at Ed Huguenin's place near Addy Saturday night the 16th. There will be good music, and everybody is invited.

H. P. Davis and family and Wesley Davis of Scranton, Pa., and Chandler Bluhdorn of Wilkesbarre, are at Loon Lake looking after their orchards interests. H. P. Davis represents a number of Scranton buyers and Mr. Bluhdorn is looking after the interests of his uncle, E. T. Shepard, who has 15 acres in orchard. They are enthusiastic over the climate and the orcharding possibilities of the Loon Lake country, and have found that many other Pennsylvanians have located in this county for similar reasons, finally organizing a county Pennsylvania society with a membership of 80 to date. The Loon Lake project has 2000 acres all with perpetual water right, and 100 acres more will be planted to orchard this year, for Pennsylvania people.

The supreme court has sustained the Stevens county superior court in the case of the state vs. Marshall Tilden, who was convicted by a jury over a year ago for statutory offense. Tilden's home is at Kettle Falls.

The death of George R. Myers of near Douglass falls occurred last week Friday evening about 6 o'clock. Although he had been ailing for some time, his death was a shock to his family and friends. He was lying on a sofa visiting with his daughter Mae when he was stricken with a severe sick spell and in an hour's time he had passed into the eternity that lies beyond the grave, having that day reached the age of 62 years. His birthplace was at Noblesville, Ind. On Nov. 21, 1873, at Prairie du Chien, Wis., he and Miss Alice Myers joined their lives in marriage, and to this union eight children were born, six of whom are living: Miss Mae Myers, a teacher in the Colville schools; Mrs. Clyde A. Crandall of Hawkeye, Iowa; Roy Myers of Dover, Idaho; Clarence Myers of Spokane, and Max and Walter Myers, who are living at home.
