A pathetic case is that of thirteen year old Emma Tabascos, the Republic girl who caused the marshal and others a night of anxiety, Thursday of last week. A motoring party saw her about dusk headed for Meyers. After getting the marshal they returned to the place where she had been seen, but she had disappeared, leaving no trace. After covering all the roads leading from here to Meyers, sweeping the woods with the searchlights without sign of the missing girl, they made further search of the town of Meyers Falls. As this resulted in nothing, the hunt was given up for the night. But Marshal Growden, determined that a slip of a girl should not outwit him, was up betimes the next morning and took the early stage into Meyers. He found his quarry rolled up in her blankets in the little grove just beyond the town, and returned with her to Kettle Falls enroute to Republic.

C. C. Dill of Spokane, democratic candidate for congress, spent Tuesday in town in the interest of his election. Mr. Dill is making an aggressive fight for election in every county in the district. He is spending practically all his time out among the voters in the various counties, and holding meetings nightly. Mr. Dill began politics several years ago under Tom L. Johnson of Cleaveland, and has been on the progressive side of public questions ever since. During the two years from 1911 to 1913, that he was in the prosecuting attorney's office in Spokane, he proved himself an able lawyer. In 1913 when Governor Ernest Lister was inaugurated he immediately appointed Mr. Dill his private secretary. After nine months Mr. Dill resigned for practice of law. In this campaign he stands upon the democratic platform, and long ago declared in favor of woman suffrage throughout the whole country. He favors a rural credit law that will lower the rates of interest to the farmers, and a national child labor law. Mr. Dill is an eloquent speaker and is well worth hearing on the political issues of the day.

A good-sized audience listened to Dr. Shield's address in the Presbyterian church Sunday evening on the subject of the state-wide prohibition. He is an impressive speaker, marshalling his arguments and facts in a convincing manner. He read communications from governors of prohibition states, mayors of dry cities, reliable and authoritative statistics, reports and resolutions from conventions of physicians of world-wide note, and the findings of various committees on child welfare and bureaus of improved conditions among the victims of vice, insanity and crime. It is a pity there was an empty chair in the auditorium.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

I, A. B. Sansburn, county auditor, hereby give notice that general election will be held in all the regular voting precincts of Stevens county, Washington, on the 3d day of November, 1914. The polls at said election will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. on said day. In all precincts in incorporated cities and towns in said county, all precincts outside said incorporated cities and towns the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. on said day.

The following named candidates, nominated at the primary election, will appear on said election; also the following named initiative and referendum measures, amendment, and township organization.

There will be submitted at said election the following propositions: INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 3, ENTITLED—"An act prohibiting the manufacture, sale, or other disposition of intoxicating liquors, except in certain cases; regulating and keeping, use and transportation of the same; providing for the enforcement of this act; and imposing punishments and penalties for the violation thereof."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 6, ENTITLED—"An act relating to corporations, partnerships, associations and persons engaged in the business of dealing in lands, stocks, bonds and securities, to prevent fraud and imposition in the sale of the same, and transferring to the public service companies all and sundry franchises and property of state in respect to corporations."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 7, ENTITLED—"An act abolishing the bureau of inspection and supervision of public officers, vesting in the state auditor all the powers and duties of such bureau, and requiring the state auditor to prepare a balance sheet showing the operating deductions from salaries and expenses of each department and institution of the state."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 8, ENTITLED—"An act to prohibit the collection of remuneration or fees from workers for the securing of employment, and for the information of the law, and providing for a penalty for violation thereof."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 9, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the payment of the cost of medical, surgical and hospital treatment, nursing, supplies and other expenses of workmen injured in extra-hazardous employments, by the employer to the amount of the net profits of the business, and requiring the state auditor to prepare a balance sheet showing the operating deductions from salaries and expenses of each department and institution of the state."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 10, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the employment of all convicts upon public highways except in certain cases, authorizing the payment of certain dependent families of such convicts, creating a state road fund, providing a tax levy of not more than one-half mill therefor, transferring the public highway fund thereto, and making an appropriation of two million dollars for the improvement of the same."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 11, ENTITLED—"An act prohibiting employers from requiring or permitting employees to work more than eight hours in any day of twenty-four hours, except in agricultural, mining and cases of emergency; providing for extra compensation for overtime; and fixing a penalty for the violation thereof."

REFERENDUM MEASURE NO. 1, ENTITLED—"An act to establish a retirement fund to be used in payment of pensions and benefits to retired officers, principals, supervisors, supervising principals and superintendents of the public schools of the state of Washington; creating a board of trustees; defining the sources from which said fund shall be raised; providing for the levy of taxes and regulating the collection, management and disbursement of said fund."

REFERENDUM MEASURE NO. 2, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the construction, maintenance and operation of a system of storage and irrigation works for the purpose of irrigating lands in Grant, Adams, Chelan and Douglas counties, including lands in the Quincy valley; creating a state reclamation board and providing for the sale of state bonds not exceeding \$40,000,000 in amount, the proceeds of which shall be used for the purpose of the same."

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED BY THE LEGISLATURE, ENTITLED—"An amendment of section 33, article 2 of the state constitution, enabling alien residents of this state to acquire by purchase and hold lands lying within municipal corporations, and providing for the escheat of such lands to the common school fund in case the owner thereof becomes a non-resident of the state for the term of five years."

ORGANIZATION—Shall the system of township organization be adopted in Stevens county, Washington?
