

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

I, A. B. Sansburn, county auditor, hereby give notice that a general election will be held in all the regular voting precincts of Stevens county, Washington, on the 30 day of November, 1914. The polls at said election will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. on said day, in all precincts in incorporated cities and towns in said county, in all precincts outside said incorporated cities and towns the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

The following named candidates, nominated at the primary election, will be voted on at said election; also the following named initiative and referendum measures, amendment, and township organization.

There will be submitted at said election, the following propositions: INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 3, ENTITLED—"An act relating to the manufacture, sale, or other disposition of intoxicating liquors, except in certain cases, regulating the same, and providing for the enforcement of this act; and fixing punishments and penalties for the violation thereof."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 6, ENTITLED—"An act relating to corporations, copartnerships, associations and persons engaged in the business of dealing in lands, stocks, bonds and other securities, preventing fraud and imposition in the sale of the same, and transferring to the public service commission all authority vested in the secretary of state in respect to corporations."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 7, ENTITLED—"An act abolishing the board of inspection and supervision of public officers, vesting in the state auditor all the powers and duties of such board, and requiring the state auditor to prepare a balance sheet showing the operations, transactions, receipts and expenses of each department and institution of the state."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 8, ENTITLED—"An act to prohibit the collection of remuneration or fees from workers for the securing of employment or furnishing information leading thereto, and providing for a penalty for violation thereof."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 9, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the payment of the cost of medical, surgical and hospital treatment, nursing, supplies, and other expenses of workmen injured in extra-hazardous employments, by the employer to the amount of one hundred dollars, any excess to be paid by the industrial insurance department."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 10, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the employment of labor upon public highways except in certain cases, authorizing the payment of certain sums to dependent families of such laborers, creating a state road fund, providing a tax levy of not to exceed one-half mill thereon, transferring the public highway fund thereto, and making appropriation of two million dollars for carrying out the provisions of this act."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 11, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the retirement fund to be used in payment of annuities and benefits to retired teachers, principals, superintendents of the public schools of the state of Washington, creating a board of trustees, defining the source of the fund, and providing for the levy of taxes and regulating the collection, management and disbursement of said fund."

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 12, ENTITLED—"An act providing for the construction, maintenance and operation of a system of storage and irrigation works for the purpose of irrigating lands in Grant, Okanogan, Chelan and Douglas counties, including lands in the Quincy valley; creating a state reclamation board and providing for the sale of state bonds not exceeding \$40,000,000 in amount."

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED BY THE LEGISLATURE, ENTITLED—"An amendment of section 33, article of the state constitution, enabling the residents of this state to acquire by purchase and hold lands lying within municipal corporations, and providing for the sale of such lands to the common school fund in case the owner thereof becomes a non-resident of the state for the term of five years."

TOWNSHIP ORGANIZATION—Shall the system of township organization be adopted in Stevens county, Washington?

This association, organized for the promotion of the livestock industry in Stevens county, and for the benefit of those directly engaged in livestock production, offers many features for its membership.

The annual dues are \$2, and membership may be secured at any time by remitting to the secretary.

The annual show is intended to be the main feature of the association, and will be held yearly at some point in the county.

This year the show will be held at the county fair grounds, Colville.

Every resident of Stevens county is entitled to compete for any or all prizes offered, whether he be a member of the association or not.

No fee will be charged for entering stock for prizes.

No entries for prizes will be received after 2 p. m. of the first day of show.

No charge will be made for stock quarters during the show. Exhibitors may bring their own feed, or may purchase at a reasonable price on the grounds.

Regular auctions will be held on the show grounds on the second and third days, commencing in the forenoon.

Judges of recognized ability from outside of the county will be in attendance, to judge stock.

Every stock owner in the county is entitled to take advantage of the auction. Association members will pay a commission of 2 1/2 per cent for auction service, and non-members 5 per cent, the commissions all going into the association treasury. Any person may bring stock to the show and have it sold at auction.

Every animal exhibited at the show may be sold at auction, if desired, at a cost of 2 1/2 per cent to association members, and 5 per cent to non-members, the commissions all to go into the association treasury. Auctioneers H. C. Cranke, M. A. Daggy and William Buckley have offered their free services to the association as auctioneers during the show, assuring stock men of good auctioneering.

The Colville Chamber of Commerce will furnish free transportation from Colville to and from the show grounds, to all association members and out-of-town visitors who register at the headquarters.


