Judge Samuel Douglas, for 30 years a prominent member of the Stevens county bar and a pioneer of the state of Washington for nearly 35 years, died last week Friday evening at 10:30 o'clock...

Mr. Douglas was born in Alabama 58 years ago and spent his boyhood with his parents, who afterward moved to Pennsylvania. His father, Joseph Douglas, who moved with his family to Spokane in 1883...

In 1884 he was elected probate judge of the county, which then included all of Okanogan, Ferry, Stevens and Pend Oreille counties.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the M. E. church, accommodations being inadequate at the Seventh Day Adventist church, of which the deceased was a prominent member for a number of years.

Mr. Douglas was endowed with a character of integrity, a jovial nature and a religious temperament. His departure is mourned by many friends.
