**Cases Filed Since 1889**  
Since the state of Washington was admitted into the Union in November, 1889, there have been filed with the clerk of the superior court in Stevens county 5072 cases as shown by the appearance docket, which is the registry of all civil and criminal cases; and in the probate department 1083 petitions have been entertained. This includes all litigation arising in Ferry county prior to 1898, and in Pend Oreille county up to 1911.

In 1913 there were filed in the general department, which includes civil, criminal and mixed cases, 383 appearances, and in 1914 402 cases, an excess of 19 cases. In 1913 85 cases were filed in the probate department,

and only 80 in 1914, a decrease of 5. This department handles the administration of estates of deceased persons, of incompetent persons, and insanity cases.

The mothers' pension department, which was opened under the 1913 law, granting pensions to destitute mothers for the benefit of their children, has filed 34 petitions for relief, since the 1st of July, 1913, and 28 pensions have been granted; some of these, however, were temporary and have been discontinued when conditions arose which alleviated the necessities of the case. Under the pension orders granted, 65 children under 15 years have been given relief, and up to January 1, 1915, \$3590.50 has been distributed in pensions, the average payment running approximately \$200 per month.

During the year 1913 there were 26 original applications for citizenship papers, and in 1914 only 17.

### Splendid Poultry Exhibit

A three-day show of the Stevens County Poultry Association opened here Thursday. The officers have labored unceasingly with concerted efforts to the end that this show should surpass everything in the annals of Stevens county shows, and as a result the showing is splendid. Every coop is filled. Rhode Island Reds and White Leghorns lead in numbers. The largest outside displays came from Spokane and Molson. The heaviest bird in the show is a 11-pound Rhode Island Red cock, exhibited by E. L. Pallies of Molson. All birds are splendid, and markings were close. A feature of the show is the coop of Golden pheasants, natives of western and southern China, exhibited by Broderius Bros. of Northport. Other features are the exhibitions of game fish and birds by C. J. Rhode, game commissioner. A lively interest is taken in the fine display of thoroughbred poultry, and the show, which is supported by the Colville Chamber of Commerce, is a decided success from every standpoint.
