INDIAN ALLOTMENTS FOR SALE

UNDER COLVILLE AGENCY, NESPELEM. Notice is hereby given that sealed bids under the conditions hereinafter set forth will be received by the superintendent of the Colville agency, Nespelem, Washington, to be opened September 15, 1915, on the following described Indian lands. The bids should be submitted in sealed envelopes, marked "Bid on Indian land," to be opened at Colville agency, September 15, 1915. The bids should not show on the outside of the envelope the description of the land upon which the bid is made. If a bidder desires to bid on more than one piece of land, he must submit a separate bid for each tract. Every bid must be accompanied by a certified check on some solvent bank, payable to the order of the superintendent of the Colville agency, for 10 per cent of the amount bid. The remaining 90 per cent of the amount bid may all be paid in cash at the time of acceptance of the sale, or an additional 15 per cent may be paid upon the acceptance of sale and the remaining 75 per cent in three equal annual installments secured by notes bearing 7 per cent interest per annum. There will be reserved from all lands sold a right of way for ditches and canals constructed by authority of the United States. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved to the commissioner of Indian Affairs. No bid for less than the appraised value of the lands shown in this advertisement will be considered. The certified checks accompanying all bids which are rejected will be returned to the bidders immediately after the bids have been opened. In case default is made by the successful bidder, his accompanying certified check for 10 per cent of the amount bid will be forfeited for the use of the Indian owner, and in case default is made in future payments on the deferred payment plan, an additional 15 per cent of the purchase price will be so forfeited. The interest on all notes of purchase setting forth fully the terms of the sale, is delivered to the purchaser after the memorandum of sale has received departmental approval, and when the payments have been completed, title to the land is conveyed to the purchaser by patent in fee from the government, except in the cases noted below in which conveyance will be made by deed from the Indian owners, after being approved by the department. Purchasers of such lands are required to pay all costs of conveyancing, and in addition an amount not to exceed \$2.50 on each purchase to be used by the disbursing officer to pay for the advertising of the land. The applications for the sale of all lands described below have already been approved by the commissioner of Indian Affairs, and very little, if any, delay in the approval of any sale is anticipated. Bidders, owners and other interested persons are permitted to be present when the bids are opened if they so desire.
