## COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

Francis C. Ward and Lawrence Woolen, well known Columbia river valley farmers, were arraigned last Saturday on four informations alleging grand larceny in the taking of cattle from the range, two of which were the property of L. M. Cornwall and two the property of B. B. Frazier, during September. Judge J. Stanley Webster of Spokane fixed the total bail of each defendant at \$1500. Both prisoners furnished bail and were released Tuesday. Ward and Woolen are represented by Attorneys Carey & Johnson.

H. D. Mason has filed divorce suit against his wife Eva Mason on the grounds of abandonment. The couple were married at Sprague Nov. 11, 1891, and have three children: Mariam Eva Mason, aged 19, and Roy, aged 10, who are with their mother, and John, aged 15, who is living with plaintiff. The complaint states that the family has lived on their irrigated orchard tract near Gifford, consisting of 6.29 acres, the last 10 years, the wife abandoning her husband and home a year ago. Plaintiff asks the court to decree him owner of the land and to give him the custody of his son John.

In the superior court the Central Life Assurance Society was given judgment for \$795 against J. W. Campbell, Anton Sampson and others on a promissory note.

Dolen-Gernsdorf Co., a corporation, has taken judgment against Wilber G. Hammond and William A. Cochrane for \$100 and costs on promissory note.

Frank W. Dickey has brought suit against John M. Smith to recover on two notes issued at Chewelah Aug. 31, 1914, totaling \$630.56. The debt is secured by a mortgage on lots 7 and 8, block 4, Kielling's addition to Chewelah, lot 2, block 5, Crestmore addition to Chewelah. Albert Kulzer of Chewelah is attorney for plaintiff.

Judge J. Stanley Webster of Spokane presided on the superior court bench here last Saturday.

Last Saturday Attorney L. C. Jesseph was appointed administrator of the estate of Alexander Baker, with bond fixed at \$1100.

The damage suit of \$25,000 against the United Copper Mining company by the city of Chewelah has been satisfactorily adjusted out of court. The action for damages was instituted by reason of refuse from the dump flowing into the creek above the city reservoir, rendering the water unfit for domestic use. The mining company has agreed to impound the slimes from the mill.

I. T. Peterson, of Marcus, has sold his 160-acre ranch situated on the north side of the Columbia river near that place, to Benj. Luebka, recently from Iowa, for \$7,200.
