
Rev. Geo. E. Kline Comes to Colville Free Methodists

ORDINANCE NO. 108 (N. S.) An Ordinance Authorizing the City of Colville to Enlarge, Extend and Increase Its Present System of Water Works, by Increasing the Volume of Its Present Water Supply by the Construction of a Reservoir, and the Making Necessary Repairs, Replacements and Enlargements Thereof, Adopting Plans and Specifications Therefor and Providing for Payment for the Same Out of the Water Revenue of Said City, and Repealing All Ordinances or Parts of Ordinances in Conflict Herewith.

Section 1. That the present water works system is found to be inadequate and insufficient in capacity for the needs and protection of said city, that the present flow of water into the mains being unequal to the demands made upon it, and entailing an unnecessary expense for pumping power, and to secure proper protection, efficiency and economy in the management and operation of said water works system, the making of immediate enlargement, extension, repairs and replacements to remedy such defects is imperative.
