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

COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

Harold H. Montgomery, through his attorney Albert I. Kulzer of Chewelah, has filed a suit in foreclosure of labor liens against the Monarch Mining Company to satisfy claims of \$164.50 for plaintiff, and \$147.75 for W. H. Montgomery, alleged to be due for labor performed during the spring of 1915. Attorney's fees are asked in the sum of \$150, and \$1.20 filing expenses. The Monarch claims are situated in the Chewelah mining district.

Oliver Hutchins of Ford last Saturday filed his petition for letters of administration on the estate of his father-in-law David W. Dearing, who died at Deer Park February 26, 1916. The estate consists of 80 acres 15 miles south of Clayton, valued at \$1,500, and \$400 worth of personal property. The heirs are Mrs. Caroline M. Dearing, widow of deceased, and the following children: James B. Dearing of Jefferson, Ore.; Everett Dearing, Deer Park; Maude Dearing-Herbert, Spokane; Iona Dearing-Hutchins, Ford; Inez Dearing, Deer Park; also, William Amis of Altona, Iowa, son-in-law of deceased. Petitioner is represented by Attys. Cunningham & Cunningham of Spokane.

Frederick Ballantyne Hall, through his attorneys Roche & Onstine of Spokane has filed action against his stepmother Mrs. Estella B. Hall to quiet title to about 330 acres at Cedar lake, 10 miles northeast of Northport. The complaint alleges that when plaintiff's father John F. Hall died on Jan. 5, 1903, he became the sole lawful heir to the land; that a few days before the death of deceased, defendant secured a signature to a will deeding her the property; plaintiff alleges the signature is not that of his father; but if so, that it was secured through undue influence practiced by defendant; that deceased at that time was in an irresponsible mental condition, wherefore plaintiff alleges that the deed was without consideration, fraudulent and void. He asks the court to decree him to be the owner of the land and entitled to immediate possession. He also asks for \$5,000 damages by reason of occupancy of the land by defendant during the last 13 years.

The will of Mrs. Nancy Lawrence, who died in Colville April 9, 1916, was filed for probate by Atty. F. Leo Grinstead. Miss Saluda Kildow, granddaughter of decedent, has petitioned the court for the appointment as executrix of the will. The will named Mrs. Lawrence's brother Wesley Lawrence of Fairfield, Ohio, as executor, but he is disqualified by reason of his residence in Ohio to attend to the affairs here. The estate consists of a house and lot at Lancaster, Ohio. The heirs are Mrs. Louise Kildow of Colville and Grant Holland of Ohio, children of deceased, and the following grandchildren: Nettie Smith, King Browne, Clint Browne, Flossie Bradican, Russell Browne, Beltrum Browne, Murray Conrad and Oran Conrad.

W. H. Matthews was given judgment Wednesday by Judge W. H. Jackson against Jesse D. McDonald to recover \$1,000 in a mortgage foreclosure action, involving 160 acres eight miles northeast of Chewelah. Judgment includes \$100 attorney's fees, and \$14 costs. The mortgage was dated Jan. 18, 1913. Plaintiff was represented by Atty. Oscar Cain of Spokane.

Petition for probate of will of Louis Lovell Tower of Northport, who died May 17, was filed Wednesday, with Mrs. Minnie Perkins Tower, widow of deceased, named as executrix without bond. Besides Mrs. Tower, the heirs are four children: Louis Lovell Tower, Jr., Angelo Emery Tower,

James Allen Tower and Margaret Jeanette Tower. The will specifies that the children shall each receive \$10, with the balance of the estate willed to Mrs. Tower. Atty. Chas. P. Lund of Spokane represents Mrs. Tower.

Mrs. Mary Tomsha on Wednesday filed a complaint in probate court against her son Jacob Tomsha, who recently filed a petition for letters of administration on the estate of his father Blasius Tomsha, who died at Valley Jan. 26, 1916. Mrs. Tomsha objects to her son Jacob Tomsha handling the affairs of the estate, and petitions the court to appoint her eldest son Matthew Tomsha as administrator. The estate includes 120 acres six miles southeast of Waits lake and about \$150 worth of personal property. The heirs are Mrs. Tomsha and six children and two grandchildren. Atty. E. D. Germain represents Jacob Tomsha, while Atty. Albert I. Kulzer appears for Mrs. Tomsha.

A writ of garnishment has been issued against Dr. I. S. Clark by Dr. W. F. Diefenbacher to secure a judgment of \$425.20 recently granted by the superior court against F. J. Wynne in an action to recover on notes and accounts. The writ of garnishment is by virtue of a judgment in the sum of \$5,000 against the defendants in the case of F. J. Wynne and wife vs. Dr. L. B. Harvey and Dr. I. S. Clark, an action to recover \$30,000 damages for injuries alleged to be due to an operation performed on Mrs. Wynne several years ago. Atty. O. W. Noble represents Dr. Diefenbacher.

Thomas Freeborn, representing four cases in a labor lien foreclosure action, was given judgment Monday by Judge W. H. Jackson against the Copper King Mining Company, whose properties are located near Chewelah, in the total sum of \$1,258.65, together with \$300 attorney's fees and \$12.40 costs. This action has been in litigation the last two years. About a year ago the mining company became insolvent, and Charles Adams, banker at Chewelah, was appointed receiver. The Copper King is considered one of the richest mines in Stevens county and was purchased last summer by Spokane parties. The mine has been shut down the past year on account of litigation. Mr. Freeborn was represented by Atty. R. A. Thayer, while Atty. Albert I. Kulzer of Chewelah and Attys. Carey & Johnson of Colville appeared for the defendant. The property covered by the lien includes the boiler, engine, air compressor, blacksmith outfit, smelter equipment, buildings, generators, lighting equipment, ore cars, drills, and all mining equipment.

Mrs. Dale Jenkins of Chewelah was given a divorce Wednesday from her husband Joseph R. Jenkins on the grounds of abandonment and non-support. The Jenkins were married in Colville July 3, 1914, and have one infant daughter, Opal, which is given to the custody of the mother. Atty. E. D. Germain of Chewelah appeared for plaintiff.

Gustav Hoffman on Wednesday was granted a decree of divorce from his wife Mrs. May Hoffman on the complaint of cruel and violent treatment and desertion. The plaintiff is to recover \$7 costs. Upon the request of Mr. Hoffman, his wife's name was changed to Miss May Webber, her maiden name. The couple were married in Spokane Aug. 1, 1913; no children, and no property. Plaintiff was represented by Atty. L. C. Jesseph.

On motion of the plaintiff Judge W. H. Jackson last Saturday dismissed the case of Dr. N. Fred Essig of Spokane vs. J. W. Carter of Colville. The action was instituted to recover on account.

The action was to recover shares of stock alleged to have been sold illegally by the mining company. The case was tried last February, Judge Blake taking the decision under advisement. The defendant is to recover costs. Attorneys Tolman & King and John Salisbury appeared for plaintiff, while Atty. L. C. Jesseph of Colville handled the case for the Blue Star.

Atty. E. D. Germain of Chewelah last Saturday was given judgment against A. M. Frazier in the sum of \$923.20, which is principal and interest on two notes bearing date of May 18, 1915, and June 21, 1915. Judgment includes attorney's fees of \$100 and \$4.20. Judgment bears 10 per cent interest until paid. Mr. Germain was represented by Atty. L. B. Donley of Colville.

Henry Clark, E. A. McMeekin and O. A. Atwood have been appointed appraisers of 80 acres in the Clark lake country near Bissell, belonging to the estate of Robert S. Starbird, who died March 1, 1916, at Elgin, Ill. The only heir to the estate is Mrs. Adele C. Starbird, of Clayton, Mo., widow of deceased.

Frantz H. Alm of Chewelah, a native of Norway, Monday filed his second papers in application for citizenship. Mr. Alm is engaged at farming. He has resided in the United States since April 29, 1889. Final hearing will be in October. Witnesses were S. F. Doran and C. T. Rigg, both of Chewelah.

John Kulzer, residing 2½ miles south of Valley, is completing a two-story residence, which when finished will be one of the finest country homes in the northwest. Each bedroom will contain hot and cold water, and a laundry room will be arranged in the basement. Mr. Kulzer is also finishing a concrete swimming pool 40x50 feet.

A marriage license was issued last Saturday to Miss Kate Nagle and J. A. Penkake, both of Marcus. Miss Nagle is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Nagle, former residents of Colville. Mr. Nagle was formerly county auditor, and is now postmaster at Marcus.
