COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

The courthouse news compiled Thursday by Fannie M. Ackley exclusively for The Colville Examiner

Articles of incorporation have been filed with the county auditor for the Addy Building Association, with no capital stock. The terms of admission to membership are: All members of Addy camp No. 576, W. O. W., who for the last two years have been in good standing, and any member of the Addy W. O. W. may join the association after two years' continuous membership in the lodge. Five years' continuous membership in the lodge will entitle a member to life membership in the association. The object of the association is to practice and promulgate the principles of charity and benevolence, and to acquire and own property as may be necessary to carry such purposes into effect. A meeting will be held October 2 to elect five trustees to hold office for one year. The directors are J. V. Walker, John Brunner, Al Weatherman, C. V. Belknap and A. W. Anderson, all of Addy.

A. E. Weinke, a farmer of Park Rapids, who was fined for having a fawn in his possession, \$15 and costs, totaling \$26, by Justice F. H. Bradley, is serving the sentence out at the county jail. Mr. Weinke states that as he and his wife were driving along the road they heard the cry of the fawn in the brush, and upon locating it took it home and fed it. It became a pet and they decided to raise it, and being told that they required a permit to keep it, they wrote to the state game authorities for the permit, but were informed that a permit could not be issued and that it was unlawful to have it in their possession. Mr. WeinkeWeinke states that he then liberated the fawn, but that it refused to leave its adopted home.

The superintendent of the state hospital for the insane at Medical Lake has notified county clerk L. C. Richardson of the liberation on parole of Eva Mitchell, admitted to the institution from Stevens county, September 11, 1915.

The property was mortgaged for \$100 in July, 1907, to Urban Soklie, the incumbrance being paid off the same month, and mortgaged again for \$400, to Frank Trampus, which was also paid when due. Neither mortgage was released from record, which constitutes a cloud upon the title.

Mrs. Mina Ehendrick of Bounclay, a native of Germany, before County Clerk L. C. Richardson, was tried for insanity last Saturday, and was discharged. Dr. J. W. Henderson and Dr. William J. Jones were the examining physicians.

W. E. Alger, United States consul at Fernie, B. C., has notified the department of commerce that the Trail smelter, in conjunction with the Great Northern railroad, has reduced the freight and treatment rate on ore running between \$25 and \$50 a ton to \$3.95 per ton for mines in the Valley district of Stevens county. Of the total charge of \$3.95 the freight rate absorbs all but \$1.50.

One thousand acres of white navy beans are being harvested in the Columbia river valley between Hunters and Kettle Falls, and it is said the yield will run 700 pounds to the acre. These beans are being raised under a contract with the D. M. Ferry Seed Company of Detroit, Mich., which company furnishes the seed, inspects the fields twice during the growing season, and for the overplus, after returning the

seed, pays four and a half cents per pound for the beans delivered at the railway station. Other contracts for seed raising are being filled by farmers in various parts of the Columbia river valley, which is said to be especially advantageous to the fertility of seeds. The Upper Columbia River Company at Marble is filling a contract for flower seeds for an eastern seed house.

Marriage licenses were issued last Saturday to Mrs. Laura G. McGinnis and Everett Hubbard of Cusick, and Miss Laura M. Elwood and Wm. F. Baxter of Ard-en.

A marriage license was issued Tuesday to Miss Iva Gourley of Daisy and W. J. Stewart of Colville.

Mrs. Laura McGinnis and Everett Hubbard, both of Cusick, were married at Kettle Falls Sept. 22, Rev. Amos H. Hause of Pleasant Valley performing the nuptial ceremony.

The fair at Hunters, which closed a three day session last Saturday was a pronounced success, and in many respects surpassed all former fairs held in Stevens county. The horticultural display was the largest in variety yet shown. The livestock exhibit was the leading feature, cattle and hogs leading. A program of sports, including athletics, races and Indian games, enlivened the last day of the fair. It is estimated that 5000 attended, many coming from Spokane, Davenport and upper Stevens county towns. Music was furnished by the Chewelah and Hunters bands.

The Upper Columbia Sales Association will hold its annual meeting and sale at Marcus Oct. 6. About 200 head of cattle are in sight for sale, 12 work horses, 2 saddle horses, Percheron stallion, team of mules, 2 registered Duroe-Jersey sows, and other offerings are promised. E. H. Stanton, packer, of Spokane, will be at the sale and speak at the annual dinner, and election of officers will be held in the evening.
