WASHINGTON STATE NEWS OF INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

A big Methodist rally was held in Spokane May 22.
 The annual Whitman county high school track and field meet was held in Colfax Saturday.
 The county commissioners of Pacific county have called a postponed bond election for June 12.
 Grays Harbor county is paying higher wages for labor on road work this year than ever before.
 Gideon Cummings, aged 78, for 55 years a resident of the Wallula section, is dead of heart disease.
 Fifty thousand trout were planted in Whitestone lake near Brewster by Game Warden Clay Fruit.
 The Satsop co-operative cheese factory sold \$49,351 worth of cheese during the year ending May 1.
 The Tubbs Mill company, of the South Bend district, has machinery in transit for a mill being built near Cheshals.

Delegates of the Washington State League of Savings and Loan Societies met in annual convention at Spokane.

Bounties for 136 coyotes, two lynx and one bobcat have been paid to Lincoln county people by the county auditor's office since March 15.

Ralph Beckes, age 4 years, son of Mrs. Oliver G. Beckes of Grandview, was drowned in Union ditch by accidentally falling into the canal.

Twenty-eight referendum petitions, containing approximately 2500 names, directed against the new state "bone dry" law, were filed at Spokane.

Frank Callahan, timekeeper on the Kelso-Lowmy wheat ranch, died at Prosser from the effect of a bite from a mad dog three months before.

The crest of the high water in the Spokane river that threatened to take away several bridges at Spokane passed without causing material damage.

That the orchards of Walla Walla valley will yield record crops this season is the present indication, according to growers throughout the section.

High water has seriously but not dangerously damaged the fill around the abutment at the Vancouver end of the Columbia river interstate bridge.

Governor Lister has designated June 5, army registration day, as a state holiday, and has appointed Lieutenant-Governor Hart as director of registration.

A decree of foreclosure of a mortgage of \$15,000 on the home of Mayor Hiram C. Gill was ordered entered by Presiding Judge Everett Smith at Seattle.

James Stewart, of Tacoma, was drowned when the British steamer Corfu was sunk by a German submarine 160 miles west of Gibraltar on April 17.

Gladys Simmons, 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Simmons, of Farmington, was instantly killed when struck by a heavy touring car driven by her father.

An average of 12 pounds of wool to the fleece is the record made by Fred Smith, a prominent sheepman of Granddalles. Some of the fleeces ran to 18 pounds.

A resident of Lewis county for the last 69 years, Barton Koontz died at the age of 77 at the home of his sister on Jackson Prairie. He crossed the plains in 1847.

A. R. Metz of Pullman was elected grand chancellor of the Washington state grand lodge of Knights of Pythias at the closing session of the grand lodge at Spokane.

Frank Troeh, of Vancouver, and E. J. Chingren, of Spokane, were tied for high average, with 283 each, in the Pacific northwest trapshooting tournament at Spokane.

Aberdeen firemen are threatening a walkout on June 1 unless their pay is increased \$10 a month by that date. Other employees of the city also are demanding more pay.

The state and county fish hatchery at Leavenworth has been active. There is now ready for delivery to the waters of the Wenatchee river some 1,300,000 Chinook salmon fry.

Clarke county is contemplating the construction of a dock and bunkers for handling crushed rock and gravel for road building purposes along the waterfront at Ridgefield.

The barge Columbia No. 38, owned by the Columbia Tug & Barge company, which was driven ashore in a gale the middle of March, is being taken overland to be relaunched in Grays Harbor.

Two carloads of Russian-German workmen who are to labor in the beet fields of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, arrived at Ellensburg with their wives and children, and their household appurtenances.

The Tacoma Railway & Power company and Pacific Traction company voluntarily have increased wages of all motormen and conductors in their employ, effective June 1, the increase ranging from 5 to 10 per cent.


