COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

The Russell Supply Co., of Chewelah, has brought action in the superior court against John Ludwig and wife for the alleged failure of the defendants to liquidate a bill of \$177.75 claimed to be due for goods, ware, merchandise, furnished to the defendants by plaintiff prior to July 26, 1917.

Lillian E. Lyon versus Jay Lyon in the title of a suit filed in the office of the county clerk in which she alleges that the defendant has abandoned her and their two minor children, Basil and Biondell. They were married in Spokane, September 15, 1902. A number of lots in Colville are involved in the controversy.

J. P. Brown has begun suit in the superior court against B. W. Friske and wife for the sum of \$230 alleged to be due as a balance on account of services for the drilling of a well he commenced October 6, 1916. The price of the service was to be \$3 per foot at which rate he dug \$339 worth, but received only \$158.85 on the job.

Charles L. Davis has sued Lily Davis, his wife whom he married atavenport, Washington, in 1905 for a decree of divorce because, as he alleges, she abandoned him home in February, 1912. There are three minor children, Agnes age 11, Eugene 9, and Elinor 7.

A. A. Rutter has sued Leo M. Glasgow, of Hunters, for an alleged breach of contract in the exchange of horses. Only the answer in the case has been filed in the superior court.

Kendrick Mercantile Co., of Northport, has sued L. N. Town and Jessie Town, husband and wife, for an alleged balance of \$365 claimed to be due for goods, wares, and merchandise claimed to have been sold and delivered to defendants.

A. C. Galbraith versus E. Allen, is the title of a suit brought in the superior court, in which plaintiff is seeking to collect a balance of \$202.50 for a mercantile account. James O'Brien and the Electric Point Mining Co. have been made garnishee defendants.

Hattie G. Brexington has brought suit in the superior court for divorce from her husband Sidney W. Brexington, whom she married January 31, 1906. According to the complaint they are the parents of five children, Ruth 9, William E. 7, Ivan C. 5, Lena 4 and Lucile 2.

George Townsend, a resident at the county farm since May, died there Sunday. He had formerly lived at Orient. J. B. Morris, for a number of years a farmer in Pleasant Valley, who recently sold his interests there, has moved with his family to Spokane. Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Anderson and son Paul of Addy, Stevens county, recently returned from a trip to Franklin, Pennsylvania, which they made with their Chevrolet four-ninety, covering over 5,000 miles going and returning. Their car expenses were complete at \$28.09, which included some necessary repairs to the car.

E. C. Jones has sold his hotel property at Boyd's to Mrs. Emma Alexander, who will refurbish and reopen the hotel. Mr. and Mrs. Jones, who are pioneers of the Boyd's country, will go to California.

Beginning Dec. 1, any person operating a motor vehicle within the state which is not equipped with either a Cretch-Levick, Nevil, Conafore, McBeth or McKee auto lens will be considered a violator of the state traffic law, according to the ruling of I. M. Howell, secretary of state. In the installation of these lenses they must be so installed and focused that no portion of the beam of reflected light, when measured 75 feet or more ahead, shall raise above 42 inches from the road. The cost of these lenses ranges from \$2.75 to \$6.25.

In reply to the application of Governor Lister for 1,600 rifles for the new Washington guard regiment, recently organized, the federal authorities have sent word that they can allot this state but 500 rifles now. Although this is less than a third of what is needed Governor Lister has sent on the requisitions for them. Recently the state bought 1,600 rifles for the guard and now has them fully equipped, but in addition to the regular guard regiment in the state service there are 1,600 home guard troops drilling in various communities. It was so that the state's 1,600 rifles might be turned over to these organizations that the government was asked to arm the regular state guards with rifles. When the 500 do arrive it will mean that many more guns for the local home guard companies—State Capital Record, Olympia.

Stevens county's sale of Liberty bonds is reported at \$269,956, with 1588 subscribers. This is \$29,250 greater than the quota apportioned to this county. Segregated by banks, the following amounts were sold: Bank of Colville, \$7,100, First National of Colville, \$47,900, Colville Loan and Trust \$26,100, Bank of Chewelah \$21,750, Chewelah First National \$63,750, Bank of Colville at Kettle Falls \$15,050, Northport Miners and Smelters \$75,350, Springdale Farmers and Merchants \$15,250, Valley Security State \$10,800, Hunters Exchange \$14,900 The Electric Point Mining Company also purchased \$50,000 worth of bonds, but this was credited to Spokane.

G. W. Pedyford has been appointed district chairman for the Y. M. C. A. drive for \$35,000,000, which will be made throughout the country Nov. 11-18. He has named Quinn W. McCord as Stevens county chairman, and James Walsh of Republic as Ferry county chairman.

Kettle Falls weather report for October: Maximum temperature 86 on 5th and 6th, minimum 19 on 18th, average for month 48.36. Precipitation .15 of an inch. P. F. Schroeder, observer.

The Big Chief Mining Co., with a capital of \$1,000,000 with share of a par value of \$1, has been organized at Northport. The incorporators are Joseph H. Reed, Marble; F. M. Turner, Q. D. Standiford, W. B. Wilber, Jacob Broderius and A. V. Downs of Northport and C. S. Jennings of Colville.

There were, on November 1, 1917, \$125,885 in Federal farm loans in force in Stevens county. This is an increase of approximately \$25,000 since October 1. The average growth of the loan business in Stevens county, since June 1, has been \$25,000 per month. Owing to the shortage of help in the Federal Land Bank, including the field force of inspectors, the business of the bank is badly congested, and it is said relief

cannot come until provided by congress when it convenes in December. Applications now on the books, however, will be inspected, it is said, by the Spokane officers, during the month of November.
