## WASHINGTON STATE NEWS OF INTEREST

### Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

Extensive deposits of lime have been discovered at Sundale.

Ole Nevadick, a sailor, was killed in a street brawl in Seattle.

The annual convention of the Pythian Sisters of district No. 2 met at Harrington.

By a score of 28 to 0 the Washington state college football team beat the University of Montana at Spokane.

Thomas J. Hickman, aged 82, Civil War veteran and pioneer of the West, died at Walla Walla after an illness of several months.

The Motorship Construction company of Vancouver has secured contracts to date for the construction of over 600 lifeboats.

Members of the I. O. O. F. from southeast Washington gathered in Walla Walla for the 11th semi-annual district convention.

A total net profit of \$95,184.00 was realized on the interstate bridge at Vancouver from its opening in January until November 1.

An agricultural council has been organized in Walla Walla for the purpose of endeavoring to solve agricultural problems as they arise.

Nearly 100 girls of the state college at Pullman have joined the girls' rifle club, and instruction under the direction of Sergeant W. N. Puckett has been started.

The American casualties with the Canadian forces reported recently include T. G. McLean, G. Martin and R. W. Smeed, of Spokane, and Stuart McKenzie, Snohomish.

Farm women of the North River country are giving 1000 quarts of canned fruits and vegetables to the Aberdeen Red Cross as their contribution to the cause.

As a result of a wreck a mile east of Hillside, a small station in Yakima canyon, 20 miles east of Ellensburg, a Northern Pacific engine and 17 cars of freight are lying on the bottom of the Yakima river.

Charged with having presented for payment to the board of Okanogan county commissioners a false voucher, with intent to defraud the county, County Treasurer F. W. Plessinger was placed under arrest.

A three-day drive for sugar beet acreage, on the success of which depended whether the Utah-Idaho company would build a factory at Toppenish, ended with 6900 acres signed. The required acreage was 6000.

Authority for trial by military court of the 14 members of the I. W. W. arrested at Camp Lewis, American lake, has been requested of the department of justice by Major General Greene, commanding the division.

Outplaying their opponents, but lacking the punch to score, the University of Washington football team held the Oregon Agricultural college team to a scoreless tie in one of the hardest-fought games ever seen on University field.

When pay day came for beet raisers at the office of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company in North Yakima, some 3000 growers received amounts aggregating \$125,000, representing returns on 18,000 tons of sugar beets harvested in October.

Two large contracts for timber have just been closed in Lewis county. Robert Barr and associates purchasing 35,000,000 feet of timber from the Puget Sound Mill company, and E. M. Shintaffer purchasing 5,000,000 feet near Toledo.

Ten thousand men will be put into the spruce forests of Oregon and Washington at once to speed up production for airplanes, and operations will be pushed to the limit straight through the winter, in an endeavor to produce 10,000,000 feet of spruce every month.

One of the largest, if not the largest real estate deals ever made in the vicinity of Goldendale was closed last week when John Atkinson sold his 1044-acre farm east of Goldendale to Charles McDowell, of The Dalles, Or. Mr. McDowell paid \$41,760, or \$40 per acre, for the property.

Along the Spokane, Portland & Seattle line, Spokane to Snake river, the crop situation is very discouraging. With the exception of Kahlotus, there is hardly an acre of ground seeded to fall grain. At Kahlotus, it is said, one farmer has seeded 240 acres and another about 800 acres.

New jobs for 1000 workmen—loggers, millworkers and shipbuilders—will be open in Grays Harbor county within the next 90 days. Employment agents say 600 men are now needed in the mills and camps of the Grays Harbor district at wages the highest on record in that section.

Running far ahead of earlier estimates, indications are that the north western apple crop this year will total 21,000 cars, according to L. J. Blot, salesmanager of the Spokane Fruit-growers' company. Before picking started, the most optimistic estimated the crop at not more than 16,000 cars.

The first drafted man in Camp Lewis to receive a commission in the regular army was Arwed Charles Baltzer, who received one as a provisional second lieutenant of cavalry. Lieutenant Baltzer was a private in company B of the 316th military police and was drafted from Moscow, Idaho.

A building opposite the county stockade, erected as a home for jobless workmen when Seattle was confronted with a problem of the unemployed, will probably be repaired and used as an isolation home for immoral women found to be a menace to the health of soldiers and sailors and residents of Seattle.

Positive orders were received by North Yakima officials of the Northern Pacific company that fruit shippers who refuse to load 756 boxes to a car will not be furnished cars in the future. Fruit shipments from the Yakima valley this season have reached 9581 cars and will pass the 10,000 mark this week.

Every family in Washington is urged to observe strictly a wheatless Wednesday each week in addition to one wheatless meal and two meatless meals each day, beginning this week, in a telegram received from Charles Heberd, federal food administrator for Washington, who is at Washington, D. C., in conference with Food Administrator Hoover.

Wheat selling operations in the Pacific northwest, which have been interrupted since November 5 because of the congestion and the placing of an embargo on shipments to Pacific coast terminals will now be resumed. Satisfactory arrangements have been made to meet the emergency caused by farmers selling grain faster than it could be absorbed at the terminals.

Because of failure to load cars to their maximum capacity or to unload cars promptly, five North Yakima fruit shippers have been cut off from further cars, by orders of the railroad war board of the Oregon-Washington Railway & Navigation company. In four of the cases the complaint was failure to load to capacity and in the fifth case delay in unloading was charged.

The wheat crop of Washington this year was only about 50 per cent of normal, according to an estimate of P. J. Sweeney, chief grain inspector. Oats and barley also were below normal. Wheat production is estimated at 27,000,000 bushels as compared with 45,000,000 bushels a year ago. Oats are estimated at 3,200,000 bushels compared with 4,872,000 last year, and barley at 2,050,000 bushels as against 3,075,000 last year.

Mrs. Dora Miller, of Seattle, and Mrs. Hilda Sandberg, of Kirkland, will be deprived of their mothers' pensions from the state of Washington because of their alleged disloyalty as the result of an order issued by Judge King Dykeman, of the King county juvenile court. The court further recommended that the women be deported because of their alleged pernicious influence in this country. They are charged with being openly pro-German.

There is a heavier demand for farm loans in the Pacific northwest than in any other section of the country, as shown by a statement of the federal farm loan board. Farmers in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana have applied, in the aggregate, for loans amounting to \$28,764,774, and loans have thus far been made by the Spokane bank to the total of \$3,849,590. Washington farmers have applied for \$9,044,889, and the loans issued total \$1,259,075.

Grays Harbor county contains approximately 27,800,000,000 feet of standing timber, according to estimates made by Assessor Sherman Hoover from the county cruise. This is being cut at the rate of about 1,000,000,000 feet a year. The cruise, which was made three years ago, shows 1273 sections of green timber or 35 1/2 townships in the county. Besides this there are seven sections in the Indian reservation, seven sections in the national forest and 23 sections or 46,235 acres have been logged in the past three years.

Immense war restaurants that will sell certain articles of nutritious food at cost will be established by the government in Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane, in this state, and other big cities of the United States before the war is over. This will be the administration's solution of the food problem that promises to become more acute than ever during the coming months, according to Hervey Lindley, chairman of the northwestern division of the Christmas Red Cross membership drive, who has returned from Washington, D. C.

W. V. Tanner of Olympia, attorney general of Washington; John J. Sullivan of Seattle, member of the general council of the American Bar association; Warren W. Tolman of Spokane, member of the Olympia council of the American Bar association, and N. C. Richards of North Yakima, president of the Washington State Bar association, have been named as an advisory committee to assist the governor in organizing boards and mobilizing the lawyers of the state for service in connection with further operations under the selective service law, beginning December 15.
