DEATH CALLS PROMINENT CITIZEN OF KETTLE FALLS

Herman W. Zapel of Kettle Falls died on Thursday of last week at the home of A. W. Smith of Meyers Falls where he had been for about three weeks suffering from a stroke of apoplexy followed by paralysis. Mrs. Zapel, who was visiting in Los Angeles at the time he was taken ill, was sent for at once and was at his bedside when he passed away.

Mr. Zapel was one of the leading citizens of Kettle Falls and his death is a personal loss to all the people there. He was before his death the promoter and owner of a plant which he had completed this spring for the production of fullers earth situated about a mile south of Kettle Falls. The whole undertaking had been left in his hands by the death of his partner, H. W. Severin and it is not decided what will be done with the plant by the heirs of the two partners.

Mr. Zapel was fifty-eight years old and leaves a widow and two sons, Raymond of Meyers Falls and Elmer of Kettle Falls. The latter is a member of the graduating class of Kettle Falls and its president. He was born on the third of November, 1861 in Chicago, Illinois, where he has a sister, Mrs. Edward Schultz, and mother, Mrs. R. Zapel, and three brothers, Carl, Otto and Fred.

The funeral services were held at the home of A. W. Smith in Meyers Falls, Rev. J. S. Bell of Colville preaching the funeral sermon. There was prayer by Rev. Hause of Kettle Falls and Mrs. J. M. Williams of that place sang two beautiful solos. Many of the family friends were present from Kettle Falls. Mrs. Zapel, with her sons, Raymond and Elmer, accompanied the body to Spokane for incineration.

CAMP LEWIS MEN THERE SAYS RETURNED SOLDIER

"How long will this war last? Well, that is a hard one. I don't think that it will last longer than this fall. All that is needed to dislodge tired Fritz is new, fresh men and America is sending them there."

This is the belief of C. J. McKellar, a Seaforth Highlander recently returned from France. McKellar, who is an American, enlisted at Revelstoke, B. C., over two years ago. During the battle of Lens a shell burst near him. He received 8 serious wounds and spent about the same number of months in the hospital in England and France. He wears the gold bar on the left sleeve indicating that he has been wounded in battle and two blue chevrons on the right sleeve.

McKellar knows that America is sending men, because he saw them in Liverpool, among them 1500 Camp Lewis men mostly all from California. They expressed to him their belief that they would get three months in England and three in France.

Services were held Sunday afternoon in Kettle Falls for Herman Keyser who died suddenly in Portland from heart trouble. The Baptist church where they were held was filled with the many friends of Mr. Keyser. The Masons had charge of the funeral and the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs attended in a body. The deceased was a past master of the Masonic lodge and past grand of the Odd Fellows. Raymond Keyser of the Nebraska balloon corps was home on furlough to attend the funeral. Flowers and floral pieces in great numbers were in evidence. The Masonic burial service was followed and Mrs. J. M. Williams sang two solos, one of them "Shadows," in a beautiful manner. At the cemetery J. M. Williams made a short address.
