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# COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

A case in connection with the recent forest fires near Aladdin was begun when Fred Draper and Carrie Draper, his wife, commenced suit against P. F. Bowns and Minnie Browns. The complaint states that the plaintiffs own the southeast quarter, section eight, township thirty-seven north, range forty-one, east Willamette meridian, and that the defendants own the east quarter, section eight, township thirty-seven north, range forty-one, east Willamette meridian. The plaintiffs claim that on or about June 6 the defendants carelessly set fire to brush and slashing on their lands and permitted the fire to burn without necessary precautions to prevent its spread. They claim that the fire was started in the dry season, among combustible material, with no permit from the warden. The complaint states that the fire escaped and destroyed 450 cedar poles belonging to the plaintiffs of the value of \$1400 and injured and destroyed standing cedar and pine timber of the plaintiffs to the value of \$600. They claim that they have been damaged to the extent of \$2000.

Lean A. Allatt has begun suit against A. F. Strobe and Nina Strobe and W. F. Diefenbacher and wife to foreclose mortgage and promissory note for \$900, claimed to have been given to plaintiff by A. F. Strobe and wife. Complaint states that all defendants claim some right in the mortgaged property and plaintiff asks for \$900 with 8% interest from April, 1917, attorney's fee and the sale of the property, from title of which he asks that defendants be barred.

J. H. Yarwood petitioned June 26 for letters of administration for the estate of Thomas Carr who died at Marcus June 20.

Sam Smith has applied for judgment foreclosing a tax lien in a suit against Stella Houchens.

At a special meeting Thursday of last week, Mayor Bowers and the members of the Chewelah city council placed a ban on public meetings of every character and issued orders for the strictest enforcement of quarantine regulations for the control of smallpox, an outbreak of which has been prevalent in Chewelah. They hope to eradicate the epidemic in a few weeks with the cooperation of the citizens of the town.

A. F. Strobe, who acted as deputy assessor for Chewelah during the annual spring assessment, took a census of the town in connection with the work, and states that a compilation of his figures shows the population of Chewelah to be 1463, counting only actual bonafide residents, the heads of families and their children. It is safe to say that there is at all times a floating population of at least 300 locally, made up of single men employed at the magnesite works, but living in town, and other transient laborers, which would give this place a population at the present time of nearly 1800. At this rate Colville will have to look to her laurels, for Chewelah will soon be able to claim the honor of being the largest town in the county.—Chewelah Independent.

# REPUBLICAN CONVENTION ENDORSES JUDGE WEBSTER

Stevens county republicans in convention assembled at the courthouse Saturday, June 22, unanimously endorsed Judge J. Stanley Webster for congress from the fifth district. The meeting was called to order by L. Erwin Jessep, county chairman. W. Lon Johnson was elected temporary chairman and Claude C. Casey, secretary. About sixty delegates were present.

The motion of Judge W. H. Jackson that a committee of three be appointed to recommend eighteen republicans as delegates to the state convention, was seconded by Mr. Glasgow of Meyers Falls and unanimously carried. The committee, composed of Henry R. Spedden of Colville, S. F. Doran of Chewelah and H. W. Sterrett of Northport, was appointed by Chairman W. Lon Johnson.

As delegates to the state convention the following were recommended by the committee: W. Lon Johnson of Colville, W. F. Case of Northport, Ray Dulliver of Chewelah, C. H. Inkster of Hunters, Charles Summers of Daisy, E. Burrows of Chewelah, J. P. Chandler of Laurier, George Dexter of Kettle Falls, Jesse Cagle of Meyers Falls, J. H. Yarwood of Marcus, E. E. Edwards of Valley, George Bryant of Rice, H. W. Sterrett of Northport, Joseph Reed of Marble, Senator A. W. Anderson of Adly and W. W. Palmer of Bossburg.

The interesting feature of the convention was the endorsement of Judge J. Stanley Webster for congress, leaving out all mention of F. M. Goodwin, a former leader of progressives in this district, and Senator R. A. Hutchinson, a prominent republican for many years, who are both rival candidates with Mr. Webster for the republican nomination for congress.
