

COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

Complaint and writ of attachment has been filed in the case of W. H. Graham and W. J. Artman, partners in the firm known as the Colville Implement Co., against C. H. Penzig. The plaintiffs say that they sold to the defendants a Mitchell road wagon at \$165, only \$35 of which has been paid. They ask \$130 with interest from May 11 until paid. They claim that the defendant has absconded from his usual place of residence in the state in order to avoid creditors.

Col. Clair Hunt has announced his candidacy for county commissioner in the second district, on the republican ticket. He has been a resident of this district for 20 years, and of Colville for 14 years, was formerly county engineer, and not only has the technical knowledge of road building but has had the actual experience in this county. He allotted the Spokane Indians in this county during 1906-7, and has been closely in touch with county affairs for many years.

Suit based on a promissory note for \$5200 and a mortgage on Stevens county property as security for same, was begun in superior court by Henningsen Produce Co. versus Katherine McDonald and D. J. McDonald this week. The note was originally made out to the Butte Wholesale Grocery Co. by the defendants, but was transferred, according to the complaint, to the plaintiff. It is claimed that a deed in fee simple was given by the defendants to C. E. Virden, James Casey and A. P. Henningsen to the Stevens county property as a mortgage. Claiming that the amount due him has not been paid, plaintiff asks \$5200 with interest and \$500 attorney's fees.

Suit for foreclosure of lien was begun by the Oregon Mortgage Co. Ltd. versus A. A. Addington, Delia G. Mead and John Doe Mead, Land and Colonization Co., C. W. Lindsay and Mary Roe Lindsay last week. A promissory note, claimed to have been given by A. A. Addington and Grace Addington to plaintiff in 1911, and a mortgage on Stevens county property, are basis for the suit. The plaintiff asks \$5126 with interest, foreclosure and attorney's fees.

W. M. Godfrey has been named administrator of the estate of Jennie Monroe, who died May 13 in Benton county. The deceased was a resident of Stevens county.

Thomas Murphy, aged 19, son of J. E. Murphy of Northport, settled last week with the Great Northern for \$800 damages by reason of having his arm broken on a speeder at Northport April 3.

The case of W. H. Graham versus C. H. Penzig was dismissed July 9 on the motion of the plaintiff.

Motion to retax plaintiff's cost was filed by the defendant Tuesday in the case of F. A. Savage versus J. J. Kane and Columbia Timber Products Co.

F. C. Allen has applied for judgment foreclosing tax lien against Charles H. Bierkemper and the Northport Smelting and Refining Co. He also has begun tax lien foreclosure suit against Ed Kougher.

A marriage license was issued July 6 to J. B. Baxter and Altha Moser, both of Colville.

Col. Clair Hunt has been appointed water master for the district tributary to the Columbia river in Stevens county, the appointment coming from the state hydraulic engineer Marvin Chase. Col. Hunt's work will be to apportion waters according to the legal rights of the claims, based on the 1917 water code. He makes surveys and reports, and after the rights are defined, sets the head gates. Persons desiring to have their water rights adjudicated must make application to the state hydraulic engineer, and the rights of all claimants on a stream are settled in one proceeding.

The main cable of the Bossburg ferry broke when E. T. Ramser, ferryman was crossing the Columbia Wednesday to get Dick Richart and family, waiting on the west side of the river. The ferry was carried down stream a distance of nine miles before it was caught. Mr. Ramser launched a skiff which he had on the ferry, but it almost filled with water before he embarked. He made his trip successfully, however. The river has been extremely high lately.

WAR DEPARTMENT ASKS FOR 78 SOLDIERS FROM COUNTY

Call No. 865 has been made by the war department for 78 soldiers to be furnished from Class 1 by the local board of Stevens county to be entrained on July 22. It is the rule that when a call is made for men, a sufficient number additional shall be summoned as alternates to insure the county its quota. There are, so it is reported, 99 men in the class in column of the records of the county who are subject to this call and all of them are listed, the first 78 as principals and the balance as alternates. It is estimated that some of these men are now in the service, either in the army or in the navy, but the local board has no official advice of this fact and therefore calls them. If they have enlisted a certificate must be forthcoming to clear their record or, it is said, they will be returned to the draft.

Many of the registrants have changed their places of residence a dozen times since registration and have failed to notify the local board of such change. In these cases the board simply sends their notice to the address named in the questionnaires and if they fail to respond to the call they are reported to the department as delinquent and the war authorities immediately list them as deserters. Friends and relatives of all registrants should be diligent in saving them from this ignominy by advising them at once that they are in the draft.

At this time the local board is crowded with work. The classification of the men registered in 1918 is in progress, the reclassification of over 1000 men of the first registration is also being prosecuted, and their work has been increasing under the departmental demands so that outside help has been called for. While the local board has been slow to ask people to give up their work to give a little time to the board, the department has authorized them to draft help when needed and to report all refusals for any reason. It is claimed that those who are enjoying deferred classification should give up a little time to the board.

The department of agriculture estimates the potato acreage in Stevens county this year at 1765 acres, and in the state 65,000 acres. This county's present showing of winter wheat is given as 67%, while the state average is 79%; spring wheat 60%, state average 69%; oats 54%, state average 70%; barley 65%, state average 61%.

John L. Conger, professor of history at Knox college at Galesburg, Ill., spoke at the courthouse on the evening of the 5th, on the subject of proportional representation.
