COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

Complaint concerning the insanity of John Cagle has been filed by W. E. MacBoyle.

William Miller, plaintiff in the suit against Eliza J. Geitlinger, et al, has been declared by the court owner in fee simple of the property in dispute which is the south two-thirds of the north half of southeast quarter of section 8, township 35 north, range 39 east Willamette meridian.

W. C. Smith has commenced suit versus Lillian Hite to quiet title to the northwest quarter of southwest quarter, section 23, township 35 north, range 37 east Willamette meridian.

W. B. Dupuis was granted a judgment of \$75 in the justice court before Justice of Peace A. L. Knapp, on a suit to recover damages for a three-year-old Shorthorn steer claimed by the plaintiff to have been killed by a Great Northern passenger train May 25, on the Marcus division of the road. The complaint stated that the animal without plaintiff's knowledge strayed upon the tracks and the injuries from which he died were received as he result of negligence upon the part of the railroad employes. Dupuis claimed that the agents of the company skinned the animal and gave portions of the carcass away to third parties. The Great Northern has appealed to the superior court from the above judgment given the plaintiff in the justice court.

An order has been made by the court in the case of Retter Hendrickson versus Harry W. Silke, Paul LaPlant and Nora LaPlant and R. A. Thayer, correcting the erroneous date in an order of confirmation filed on the 3d day of July, 1917, and confirming the sale by the county sheriff on the 9th day of June.

A motion and affidavit have been filed by defendant in the divorce proceedings entitled John R. Stout versus Minnie A. Stout, through her attorney L. C. Jessup, asking for funds with which to defend the action. The affidavit states that the defendant is in Townsend, Montana, teaching music to support herself and some of their children.

Certificate of partnership and assumed name has been filed by E. R. Radabaugh and B. F. Cook engaged in a garage and auto sales business in Chewelah. The firm is to be known as the Chewelah Auto company.

A hearing was held Tuesday in the Yoder divorce case on the motion of the defendant for allowance for temporary alimony, suit money and attorney's fees. There was argument by counsel and consideration of pleading and affidavits filed. There were a number of affidavits filed by both parties of the suit which were rather sensational in character. The defendant, Edith Yoder, through her attorneys, Turner, Nuzem & Nuzem, asked \$500 a month for temporary alimony, \$5000 suit money and \$5000 for attorneys' fees. The court ordered the payment of \$200 per month from August 1 to time of final judgment, \$1500 suit money and \$3000 attorney's fees. The plaintiff's attorneys have filed application for the court to fix the amount of bond on appeal and notice of appeal to the supreme court.

Vance McDaniels, arrested Friday for fishing without a license, pled guilty in Justice Willett's court in Addy Tuesday morning and was fined five dollars and costs.

Suit has been commenced by the Bank of Chewelah against D. W. Brand and August Leuer based on a promissory note for \$180, stated in the complaint to have been made by D. W. Brand to the bank and secured by a chattel mortgage.

Motion has been made by the defendant in the divorce suit of Maggie M. Thomson versus E. W. Thomson, asking the court for an interlocutory order awarding him the care, custody, and control of his eight-year-old son Starr Earle, and to allow him to see the said son pending the final determination of the action. The affidavit of the defendant states that his wife has refused to let him see his son and has been instructing the boy to have no regard or affection for him.

O. E. Ralsel has been paroled from the Eastern Hospital for the insane to the custody of his son by an order of the superior court August 25. Ralsel entered the hospital September 18, 1917.

Since canning sugar has been issued under the new system by the county food administrator or his deputies, beginning about August 3, the Stevens county administration has issued 751 first purchase permit cards and 1282 second purchase. A total of 2013 permits have been issued. These average twenty-five pounds each, so approximately 50,325 pounds of sugar have been purchased for canning in Stevens county during that time. The permit cards all go through the hands of the food administrator and then to his deputies and back again to him to be checked.

Hunting season opens Sept. 1. Do not be fooled by other reports.—C. J. Rhode, Game warden.

The Chewelah Women's club is planning to present a musical comedy with a cast of 80 people September 4, under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill of San Francisco. The proceeds are to go toward financing the maintenance of furlough houses in France, which are being operated by the federation of women's clubs.

Carl Stranger, a Chewelah boy in training at Camp Lewis, is a cousin of the famous Guy Empey of "Over the Top." He has recently received a letter from his cousin.

Heavy shipments from the Electric Point mine, the phenomenal lead producer in the northeast corner of Stevens county, discovered in 1915, saved the state of Washington from a material decrease in value of metal production in 1917, as compared with 1916. With production of approximately 9,665,513 pounds of lead contained in its ore, Electric Point brought values from \$2,048,350 in 1916 to \$2,289,285 in 1917. These figures are adduced from the preliminary report of C. N. Gerry, United States geological survey, which has just been received by Mining Truth. Stevens county led all the counties of the state in number of mines operated, tonnage shipped and in production of silver, copper and lead. Pend Oreille county led in zinc production, and Ferry county in gold. Ferry was also second in amount of silver and copper produced, although production of copper is negligible when compared with that of Stevens county.—Northwest Mining Truth.

That the division of the Great Northern railway near Springdale seems to be under a hoodoo, is a statement of the Springdale Reformer, after the injury of John Randall last week Monday while working on a trestle just west of town. During the past six months, six people have been killed by passenger trains. The last accident occurred Monday at Grand Forks, when two little girls were struck and killed by a southbound passenger train. In addition to this, two men have been killed at Chewelah, one at Marcus, and another at Springdale.

Relatives of Sergeant Stretch of Covada, Ferry county, received word by cable and wire through Davonport, of his death July 23 from wounds received in action. The body was interred until the end of the war when it will be brought home.

Extracts from a letter written by Edgar Ferrill, produced in the Marcus Messenger, are of interest because of the hint they contain of the way the Hun is losing ground and morale. "Some German mail was captured recently and told of a great shortage of feed in Germany. One, from a girl to her brother at the front, told about killing horses to eat and that the bread was about gone. The prisoners taken are all half starved and eat a dry crust as a child would a piece of cake. Hear they are losing on all fronts, and they will lose from now on. All the prisoners I have seen are old men or young boys. The Germans don't get a minute's rest from the Americans. We throw them over, almost hundreds to their one. Can't see how the end of the war can be far away."

It is understood that the work of repairing the Springdale-Hunters road is to be commenced in a short time under the direction of the board of county commissioners, and residents on both sides of the range will welcome any improvement in the condition of the highway which will allow them to use the same, the road having been practically impassable for autos throughout the summer.—Springdale Reformer.

A sawmill near Rock Cut belonging to Orient Golden Rock Mining company has been sold at sheriff's sale by Sheriff William Miller to satisfy a judgment and decree for \$225 made to Mike Cooper, the plaintiff in the case. The mill was sold to D. R. Snyder for \$245 at the White Elephant mine.

Stanley Spurrier from somewhere in France has written to the Examiner to thank the friends who sent him tobacco. He says that they can't get it when they want it, so he was surely glad to get it.

Accidents are increasing in this state. For the year ended Sep. 30, 1917, there were 18,168 accidents. For the ten months of the present fiscal year there were 22,136 accidents. Every employer is asked to increase the safeguards against accident.

The war industries board requests that all persons having scrap iron should deliver it to the nearest dealer, as the cast iron situation is serious. The control of scrap iron and steel prices is entirely in the hands of the government.
