To Voters and Citizens of Stevens County

The superior court judges of this state are elected upon a non-partisan ballot. The aim of our law relative to the election of judges is to release judges from political party obligations, thereby encouraging them to render decisions free of political party bias. This being the object and spirit of our law in the selection and election of judges, it is accordingly the imperative duty of judges in the performance of their official duty to support, acknowledge and encourage official merit in the services of other county officials whose work is associated with and being a part of the administration of our superior court. This our judges should do without hesitancy and irrespective of the political affiliations of the officer.

There are directly connected with the work of this court the services of three county officers. These officers are the clerk of the court, sheriff and prosecuting attorney. The clerk, to a large measure, performs his duties through the assistance of these officers. The resident judge has an opportunity to observe with what skill, promptness, efficiency and agreeableness, or with what negligence, indifference or disagreeableness these officers perform their duties.

One of these officers, W. H. Butler, has been clerk of the court since January, 1917. His name will appear on the general election ballot as a candidate for county clerk and clerk of the superior court on the republican ticket. He now asks me for a public expression of my opinion as to whether or not the services which he has rendered as such clerk have met with my approval. In speaking of Mr. Butler as clerk of the superior court, I have this to say:

Mr. Butler is one of the most painstaking, industrious, conscientious and agreeable clerks this court has ever had during the past twenty years. His services as such clerk have not only been eminently satisfactory to me, but have been surprisingly satisfactory to all members of this bar and attorneys of other counties practicing at this bar. During Mr. Butler's past term of office, he has been our acting county commissioner. As such county commissioner he has successfully and very satisfactorily handled by far the greater portion of the probate and guardianship work of this court. The honesty and fairness with which his rulings have been rendered command the confidence and respect of all concerned in those proceedings. The work of our clerk and court commissioner is complicated, intricate and technical. Mr. Butler, through industry, perseverance and close attention, has become a very competent clerk and court commissioner. His office work is attended to with precision, correctness and punctuality and the records of his office are kept in a neat, orderly and business like manner. Mr. Butler's standing as a clerk of our court ranks with the standing of the best clerks of our superior courts.

Voters, however, must not take this expression of my opinion of Mr. Butler as a suggestion that they should cast their votes for him at the polls. The purpose of publicly expressing my opinion of his work is this: To call to the attention of the voters when voting at the polls for county clerk to at least a few facts which should receive consideration. As for whom the voter should vote, I am making no recommendation. That is a matter of the voters' business and responsibility, not mine.
