COLVILLE CELEBRATES ON 4th

Colville's cannon, which is brought out for all state occasions, is going to start the Fourth of July celebration in Colville when it is fired early in the morning by the veteran gunner Roy Burden. The first three-gun salute symbolizes the lonely landing of the Pilgrims. Then thirteen rounds will be fired in commemoration of the Declaration of Independence. From that time on there will be a continuous boom of noise in Colville during the Fourth of July style.

The different committees having in charge the arrangements for the day are getting things into shape for that occasion. L. S. Thurber is general chairman. Dr. P. H. Johnson, chairman of the parade committee, reports good progress and that practically every business house in the city will be represented. The parade is to start at 10 sharp.

M. A. Daggy is to be officer of the day, and B. W. Emery is chairman of the grounds committee. G. W. Peddycord will serve as chairman of the day, and D. B. Heil of Spokane

will deliver the oration. There will be a musical program by the Colville band, and Mrs. J. C. Harrigan will sing with band accompaniment. Arrangements will be made for a basket dinner at noon, which will be followed at one o'clock by sports and events on Main street in charge of Norman Wright and Dale Jones.

Northport will play the Colville baseball team at the ball park in the afternoon, and the game will be followed by one of the most popular parts of the day's program—the auto stunts. Dr. Jno. J. Ingle is chairman of the auto stunts committee and will announce a list of the stunts and prizes next week.

A concert is to be given at seven o'clock by the band. Prof. M. W. Meyer is giving this concert his best efforts and it will be too good to miss. The band will present a large number of popular selections, the best we have heard in many a day. Dancing is to be enjoyed in the Odd Fellows hall, in charge of the Chamber of Commerce committee.


