

RED CROSS HOUSE GIVES CHEER AT LEWIS

For the Red Cross, the war did not end with the armistice, and even yet there are thirty thousand soldiers and sailors still under treatment in army and navy hospitals. The Red Cross convalescent house at Camp Lewis stands next to home itself in the affections of hundreds of boys who, sick or wounded, looked forward to the day when they might leave the bare and cheerless ward in the base hospital and spend part of each day enjoying its easy chairs, its music, its books, its pictures, and its good cheer. Even now, a year after the armistice, there are overseas men, patients at Camp Lewis, not yet well enough to be discharged, who sit before the great fireplace these autumn days, thankful that The Greatest Mother is still mindful of them. The picture is duplicated in army hospitals all over the land, and wherever throughout the world American boys are still in Uncle Sam's service.
