## NEWS OF SCHOOLS

### Some of the Current News at Colville's Accredited High School

The Wantmor Candy Company, not daunted by the scarcity of sugar, and not wanting to make it any scarcer by using the available supply for unnecessary purposes, has decided to make the sale on the night of the all-school vaudeville a sugar saving proposition. Several delicious varieties of candy will be offered to the public—all made by members of the company, and all containing little or no sugar.

Both sections of the English II class have together undertaken the publishing of a newspaper as their project for the year. This paper will be known as the "Sophomore Yarns," and will contain news of everything going on at the high school in the following departments: Athletic, social, musical, dramatic, humorous, advertising, general, editorial. The venture is in charge of Harry Eslick, editor-in-chief; Lois Dexter, business manager; and Josephine Bresnahan, advertising manager. Department heads and reporters will be appointed by the chief and announcement made later.

The English III A class has organized a dramatic society, and will make the dramatization of fiction, the writing of original dramas, and the stage presentation of their own plays and those by standard authors their project for the remainder of the year. The class has already written the black-face act to be put on by the junior class on the night of the vaudeville.

The seniors besides their work on the "Skookum" have elected a humorous monthly magazine as their project. The following officers have been chosen: Jack Rice, editor-in-chief; Con Durland, business manager; Mary Allin, advertising manager. The magazine will be in the form of a twelve-page booklet, measuring five by seven inches—with a dozen laughs to the inch.

The freshman village school act will consist of the following numbers: 1. Roll call, by Schoolmaster, Don Foster. (Come and see if you can recognize the names.) 2. Primary reading class. 3. Arithmetic class. 4. Program, (a) Song "Freshmen," class; (b) Recitation, Alice Conner; (c) Dialogue, "Before Tea."

A traveling exhibit of wood which comes from the department of forestry at Portland, is on exhibit at the high school in the agriculture room. This exhibit can be had by writing for it and paying express charges for it both ways which amounts to \$1.90. There are sixteen panels of wood exhibits which include 28 samples of soft woods and 36 samples of hard woods. The panels also show the area in the United States in which the woods are grown by a small map. They also give the principal uses and physical characteristics of the woods. Other charts show the production of wood products in the different sections and in the various states of the United States and the products of the various kinds of wood. The other charts show graphically the production of various wood products for the entire United States. The map of North America shows the natural forest regions of the entire continent and a map of the U. S. gives the location of the National Forest reserves. The exhibit was gotten mainly for the classes in biology and agriculture. It is open for inspection by the entire school.

Alsberg Anderson spent the entire week of the Western Royal Livestock show in Spokane, winning fifth place in the Smith-Hughes stock judging contest. Nineteen schools were represented. The boys who placed in the first nine were to receive special prizes, but owing to circumstances which could not be controlled, these

prizes have not yet been awarded. Five hundred dollars was set aside for this work and the expenses of the three winning boys will be paid to the Portland fair and the remainder will be divided among the nineteen contestants in order to defray their expenses. The boy who won first place had a score of 243 out of a possible 280 while Alsberg's score was 200 out of a possible 280. The showing made by our contestant this year was good considering that it was difficult to get around and see the various kinds of stock that were to be judged. The work was all done after school hours and after dark. It is probable that this contest will be a feature of this show every year and the local high school expects to be able to send a contestant to each show.

A hot lunch was started this week at the high school. This consists of only one dish which is to supplement the cold lunch that the student may bring for himself. The object is to make the noon lunch department self supporting and everything is given at cost. The price is five cents a helping. This number will increase as the weather grows colder.

A ukulele club has been formed under the supervision of Miss Stephen. They held their first meeting this week at the high school. Any of the students who have stringed instruments other than violins, and who wish to join this club, please come to the next meeting after vacation.

A victrola concert was enjoyed in the high school assembly Monday afternoon. Several pieces were played. This concert was under the supervision of Miss Stephen.

Henry and Jessie Parsons of Wallowa, Ore., are enrolled in the Colville high school as sophomores. Parsons played football at Wallowa and has already played four intercollegiate games this season. He is turning out for football with the Colville squad. They have a sister in the seventh grade. Parsons' live at Arden and come to school each morning from there.

Charles Vine, a member of the senior class, is now in the Colville General Hospital where he has operated for appendicitis Nov. 14. Dr. Clark and Dr. Goetter performed the operation. Charlie is now getting along fine.

The faculty of the high school is planning a reception to be given in honor of the Stevens county teachers Monday evening in the high school auditorium.

The football squad is handicapped due to the loss of Warren, who has received a severe sprain. Kohletted is again in uniform but his arm is still badly swollen. Captain Duncan is again in old form after the Chewelah game. The team is also handicapped due to the fact that the game that was to have been played with Cheney at Colville on Nov. 21, has been canceled. This means the loss of some very good practice. In spite of all this the team is hard at work preparing for the Thanksgiving game at Chewelah. A bunch of rooters are also anxiously waiting for this trip.

The teachers' institute will be held in Colville this year commencing on the morning of Nov. 24, and extending until the 26th, at the high school. Any person having furnished rooms or who can furnish room and board for the teachers should notify the county superintendent.
