Mrs. John Bresnahan received a telegram Tuesday informing her that her son Raymond Bresnahan was about to undergo a major operation at the Letterman General hospital at the Presidio, San Francisco. Mr. Bresnahan was wounded in the Argentine two months before the signing of the armistice. The nerves in one arm were cut by shrapnel, the injury causing the hand to become withered and useless. A major operation was performed. A nerve was taken from his leg and transplanted into the arm in such a manner as to connect the ends of the nerves in the arm. At this time the young man was under the anesthetic for eight hours. One nerve, so the family have been informed, appears to have begun to regenerate. Just what the nature of the present operation may be, they do not know, but they conjecture that it is possible the surgeons are again attempting to transplant a nerve from the leg. Mr. Bresnahan has been an inmate of the hospital for a year.


I. J. Lasswell has petitioned for letters of administration in the matter of the estate of Ester Davis.
