He illustrated his point by referring to the soldier's bonus bill which, he said, was defeated by only one vote, that of a man who had been pledged to support it, but who was persuaded to vote "No" by members of the machine who laylaid him in the cloakroom. Mr. Lamping made sweeping assertions as to the mismanagement of the state institutions, which abuses he pledged himself to remedy, if elected. He declared himself in favor of a law permitting the loaning of money to farmers at 4 1/2 per cent, and finally ended by stating that if elected he would not permit the placing of little fish "one half inch long" in the waters of the state of Washington. Mr. Lamping is distinctly opposed to any form of state socialism, but favors cooperative movements for distributing rural products.

Atty. L. C. Jesseph, now of Spokane, has been named as vice chairman of the republican state central committee, taking the place of Arthur W. Davis, resigned. Mr. Jesseph, who is a much better looking man than his recent picture in the Spokesman-Review would indicate, has accepted the work and states that he will go to work at once. He has been very active in Spokane county republican politics since going there from Colville. His political headquarters will be in the Zeigler block.

That the nonpartisan league of North Dakota is the most dictatorial and undemocratic of organizations, that it has raised the taxes of his state 227 per cent, and that huge sums raised by the people of the state are used largely for political purposes, were the statements of George T. Murray, of Berthold, North Dakota, who spoke under the auspices of the republican state central committee at the courthouse Wednesday night. Mr. Murray was formerly a member of the nonpartisan league. He left the organization, he said, when he found that the rank and file of its membership had no power of initiating action. Mr. Murray said further: "It is the duty of every man in every class of society to go into politics, but we should have no class political party. It is entirely proper, however, for any class to cooperate for the benefit of its own members. It is this last plan that Mr. Murray advocates as a remedy for the wrongs inflicted upon the farmer by the present marketing system. Let the farmers cooperate in fixing the price of their wheat, he urges.

While the country has been congratulating itself on the beneficent results of national prohibition, the dispensing of liquor has been going steadily along, until the internal revenue department has declared itself wholly unable to cope with the traffic of smuggled liquor across the boundary lines from Mexico, Canada, and foreign ships which touch our shores at places and times not previously announced. Refusal of the last republican congress to provide for an enforcement of the dry law is said to be responsible for the present condition. Officials have become so concerned that they are considering a rearrangement of the government's coastal criminal-chasing arms. The customs service has found itself "wholly inadequate" to meet the situation, according to Assistant Secretary Shouse. He declared customs officials were handicapped "both in men and in money because of a refusal by the last congress to appropriate funds."

**FISH HATCHERY BUSY PLACE**

12 inches wide and 8 inches deep. They will accommodate 1,360,000 fry. The building has been filled and emptied twice this year. About 2,000,000 will have been planted in the lakes and streams of Stevens county by the end of the season. In addition to the trout fry planted, about 15,000 bass fry have been placed in Williams lake, Pierre lake and White Mud lake, as related in a recent Examiner.

Behind the fish hatchery is an enclosure of about an acre, in which are pens for the game birds hatched here. Some Chinese pheasants are now two months old. Their foster mother, a little Bantam hen, seems to think them very satisfactory offspring. "Those little fellows could fly clear to town without stopping," said Mr. Rhode. Some of the Chinese pheasants have already been liberated. Others will be taken presently to the Columbia.

Two beautiful golden pheasants and a young bald eagle complete the bird population at present. "This eagle was caught out in the hills and brought to us. Presently we heard a tale to the effect that we had mounted him. But he is a bit lively for that as you see." The bird is soon to be returned to the young man who found him.

Mr. Rhode is assisted by a deputy, L. S. Harbison. Mrs. Rhode also helps with the care of the trout eggs.


Mr. Rhode and his deputy receive their appointments from the county game commissioners, who are at present A. F. Strobe of Chewelah, J. C. Wilson of Kettle Falls, and H. T. Wentz of Colville. The county game commission was created under the state game code of 1913. The commissioners are appointed by the chief deputy state game warden for the eastern side of the Cascades. A. F. Strobe has been a member continuously since the formation of the board.

The expenses of the county game commission are paid entirely from license fees and fines for the violation of the game laws.


