NURSE SERVICE ASSURED FOR COUNTY TUBERCULARS

Due to the efforts of the Stevens County Anti-Tuberculosis League the county commissioners in a recent meeting voted in favor of securing

the services of a tuberculosis nurse in Stevens county. Such a nurse will cost about \$1800 and the League has agreed to give \$500 toward the purchase of a car to assist the nurse in reaching the different parts of the county.

The duties of such a nurse will be to visit tubercular patients who are reported to her by physicians or interested individuals and keep a record of each patient's condition. She will teach in the home by actual nursing just how the patient should be cared for, making some member of the family responsible for carrying out the necessary nursing and preventive measures in the intervals between her visits, in order to prevent infection of other members of the family.

This move on the part of the commissioners fits in with all the progressive health movements of the times and assures to the county greater safety from the menace such persons are to the rest of the community.
