

**DUCK SEASON WILL NOT OPEN UNTIL OCTOBER 1**

Although the federal law permits the hunting of ducks on September 16, the attention of hunters in Stevens county is called to the fact that the state law does not permit duck in Washington to be hunted until October 1. In this case, the state law has the authority since it affords greater protection to the birds.

"When the hunting licenses were issued," said C. J. Rhode, superintendent of the Stevens county game farm, "the date for hunting ducks was said to open September 16 when it should have read October 1. We would like various hunters to pass the word along so everyone in Stevens county will be warned of the change."

Rusch and Campbell were the successful bidders for the work of repairing the Stevens county hatchery. The bid to do the work was in the neighborhood of \$750. Among the improvements that have been ordered are the installation of concrete settling tanks, a concrete floor in the old hatchery and twelve new hatching troughs.

There is a possibility according to Mr. Rhode that another spawning station might be opened in Ferry county. If such a station is opened, everything will be done by the local hatchery to make it a success. Three million eastern brook trout are expected by Mr. Rhode for the local hatchery and also the proposed Ferry county hatchery around October. When the eggs are received half of the shipment will go to the local hatchery and the other half to the one in Ferry county.

**AGRICULTURE YEAR BOOKS FOR 1920 ARE RECEIVED**

Seventy-five copies of the United States Department of Agriculture 1920 year books have been received by County Agent H. J. Plumb. The books were sent to Mr. Plumb by the department of agriculture through the request of United States Representative J. Stanley Webster. The books will be given as long as they last to the farmers of Stevens county upon the receipt of their application. Applications should be made to the county agent, Colville.

Some of the topics discussed in the year book are killing boll weevils with poison dust, of the soil survey, phosphorus in fertilizer, pig parasites and thumps and farm helps from the birds.

Irrigation with the farmer, food for farm families, putting wood waste to work and the farmers' interests in foreign markets are the other subjects discussed by experts in their respective fields.






