On Jan. 1 a reduction of approximately 10% was made on freight shipments of livestock in car lots. By this reduction, the following changes are made in car shipments of cattle, hogs, sheep and goats from Colville to Spokane: On 33 foot car the new rate is \$46.50 as compared with the old rate of \$51.36. On 36-foot car, \$51.15 as compared with the old rate of \$56.72. On 44-foot car, \$63.14 as compared with the old rate of \$68.82.
