CHARGE DISORDERLY CONDUCT
Prosecuting Attorney Osee W. Noble and Deputy Sheriff Ledgerwood spent Tuesday in Clayton, Mr. Noble appearing in behalf of the state in the case of State vs. Tom Justice and Glenn Grove; and State vs. Ralph Grove and Emmett Moore.

Warrent was sworn out at the request of E. F. Konig, charging Tom Justice and Glenn Grove with disorderly conduct and disturbing the peace; and Ralph Grove, who is on parole from the Washington State reformatory, and Emmett Moore with second degree assault.

The matter came up for trial before Justice of the Peace F. M. Davis, and the complaint was dismissed as to Tom Justice and Glenn Grove and new complaint filed by the prosecuting attorney, sworn to by M. Konig, charging all four of the defendants with disorderly conduct and disturbing a public meeting and using vile, vulgar and obscene language.
