Persons who wish to place advertising signs within the national forests of Washington must obtain permission from a forest officer, states district forester Geo. H. Cecil at Portland. The regulations governing the use of national forest lands prohibit the mutilation, defacement or destruction of objects of natural beauty or of scenic value on such lands; and incidentally provide for legal action towards penalties for violation. Only those signs which are of distinct service to the traveling public and which are well constructed and slightly will be allowed. All persons who have already posted signs on national forest land will be requested either to remove them, or else obtain written permission from a forest officer to continue them. COUNTY COMMISSIONER

HAS FINE ALFALFA J. S. Lane farms at Boyds, owning one of the best farms in the Kettle river valley. The soil is a rich black loam, typical of the hill soils of Stevens county, with a generous mixture of gravel, which prevents it from packing and puddling when irrigated. The alfalfa on the 17th of May stood twenty-four inches high, having grown to that height in not to exceed three weeks time due to the extreme lateness of the season. During two weeks of this time the growth was slow as the weather was cool. The varieties sown represent quite a mixture as Mr. Lane has seeded at different times and had to take the seed at hand. However, Grimm represents a considerable portion of it and yields as well as any on the farm. Mr. Lane states that it yielded an average of two and one half tons to the acre, on two cuttings. A plant dug up from among the Grimm showed the characteristic spreading root system and was well inoculated. A beautiful mountain stream flows out of the valley past Mr. Lane's farm from which he takes water for irrigation. This is only required for the second crop as the first crop is made without the addition of extra water. In 1921 only 30 days elapsed between extremely heavy cuttings of alfalfa, and the only objection Mr. Lane found to having such heavy alfalfa was that the shocks were so thick that they had to bunch them in order to have room for the wagons to go in hauling the hay off to the barn.

Sibley's Addition to the City of Colville, Washington, and Extending from the South Line of Astor Avenue to the North Line of Birch Avenue in the City and Comprising an Area of Sixty (60) Feet by Three Hundred (300) Feet, and Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict With This Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 163 (N. S.) An Ordinance for the Sale or Disposal of Property Belonging to the City of Colville, Washington, and Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict With This Ordinance.

The city council of the city of Colville, Washington, do hereby ordain, enact, pass, ratify and confirm as follows: Section 1. That whenever it shall appear to the city council of the city of Colville, Washington, that it will be for the best interests of said city, that any part or parcel of the property, whether real, personal or mixed, belonging to said city, should be sold, the city clerk of said city shall first be given by the city clerk of said city, by a publication at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in the official newspaper of said city, and also by posting a notice of such intention in a conspicuous place, at or near the property to be sold, said notice to be of the same length of time. Section 2. Such notice so published shall particularly designate the property which it is proposed to sell, and shall contain full notice that the city council of said city, at its next meeting on such day at their usual place of meeting to hear and determine the advisability of making such sale. Provided, that such meeting shall be held at a time not more than one week after the expiration of the time hereinbefore designated, for the publication of the notice of such intention. The city council shall at such meeting hear evidence and take testimony, should any be offered, and shall determine the advisability of making such proposed sale, and any taxpayer in the city, whether in person or by counsel shall have the right to be heard in support of or in opposition; that the council may limit the number to be heard to not less than three, on either side for or against the proposed sale. Section 3. The city council shall then three days after such meeting make a determination as to the advisability of making such sale and their determination thereon, which said finding and determination shall be spread upon their minutes and be made a matter of record. Section 4. If the finding and determination of the city council, that it is for the best interests of said city, that such sale shall be made, and there terminate, without further action or order of the city council, the city clerk shall then cause to be entered an order on their minutes directing the city clerk of said city to sell the property at such sale will be made, and the city clerk shall give such notice in the manner prescribed in sections 1 and 2 of this ordinance. Provided, that such sale shall not be made in less than fifteen days nor more than thirty days from the date of such publication of notice thereof; and such notice shall designate the day and hour when such sale shall be made.
