COURTHOUSE AND COUNTY NEWS

Items of Interest in Stevens County, Richest in the Northwest

John Welty, county fire warden, had a narrow escape Wednesday afternoon while going up Rickey canyon on a fire call. As his car was going up the steep hill, the rear end of the car broke, and the emergency brake would not hold the car on the backward descent. Fortunately, Mr. Welty managed to keep the car from going over the grade.

Jess Hartley and Herbert Shepherd, charged with burglarizing stores in Northport, were bound over to the superior court by Justice A. L. Knapp Thursday morning.

Alva McCormick, charged with second degree assault upon Deputy Engineer Fred Thomas, was bound over to the superior court by Justice A. L. Knapp Thursday morning. His bond was set at \$2000.

Louis Enzler, charged with shooting deer out of season, whose trial was set for last Saturday, appeared before Justice A. L. Knapp and plead guilty. He stated that his son Arthur S. Enzler also included in the charge had nothing to do with the shooting of the deer. The son was freed of the charges, and the elder Mr. Enzler was fined \$25 and costs, amounting to \$51.50. "Rather expensive venison," remarked Justice Knapp.

Temporary restraining order has been entered in the case of Dominick Valentine vs. Cosmo Pede and Kettle River Trading Company, a corporation, whereby the defendants and all persons acting under them are enjoined from cutting or removing any timber from certain lands in 11-37-37, upon which the plaintiff holds a mortgage. The order is returnable Saturday, Aug. 19.

Action has been commenced in the superior court of Stevens county by Stevens county, a municipal corporation, against each and every tract, parcel of land et al for the purpose of foreclosing on certain lands in said county upon which taxes are due and delinquent.

The last will of Mattie A. Samuels, who died in Colville July 16, was admitted to probate this week, and by virtue of said will Charley C. Samuels was appointed executor thereof. Notice to creditors has been given as per order of the court.

Augusta Arnold has filed her petition in the superior court asking that she be appointed administratrix of the estate of her deceased husband Henry Arnold, who died in Spokane July 4. Deceased left real and personal property in this county.

L. L. Oman and Ida E. Oman, husband and wife, have instituted an action in the superior court against the Northwest Magnesite Company, a corporation, for judgment of \$55,481.25 together with costs and disbursements. It appears from the complaint that the plaintiffs are owners of certain lands near Chewelah worth in excess of \$150 per acre, and that said lands are capable of raising large and productive crops; that since the erection of the plant of the company, the defendant has unlawfully released from the stacks of their plant large quantities of magnesium oxide and other deleterious substances which have become mixed with the soil, and the same has poisoned and destroyed the vegetation and crops growing upon the lands. Plaintiff asks the court issue a temporary restraining order against the defendants from in any manner depositing on their lands any magnesium oxide or any other poisonous deleterious substances whatsoever, and that such temporary injunction continue pendente lite herein.

Alva McCormick, charged with second degree assault upon Deputy Engineer Fred Thomas on or about December 30, plead guilty before Judge Carey in the superior court Friday morning. As an explanation of why he committed the crime he said: "We were advised to keep them off in any way we pleased, with guns, clubs or in any way we pleased." The difficulty arose over some lumbermen wanting to haul over a road crossing the McCormick place, and the McCormicks refusing to let them do so. The legal advice which he alluded to was in regard to keeping the log haulers off, and did not apply to officers. This, McCormick said, he did not understand at the time. He was sentenced to from one to ten years at the state penitentiary.

The Stevens County Anti-Tuberculosis League held a meeting at the court house Thursday afternoon. The meeting was mostly taken up with the endorsement of bills. Another

matter of importance was the sanctioning of a policy of having each of the four doctors in Colville act as health officer for a quarter of the year, each doctor to hold a free clinic at the end of his four-month period. The doctors are in favor of this movement and it was freely endorsed by the league at the meeting. Those attending were Rev. Doyle of Chewelah, Mrs. H. J. Plumb, Mrs. J. C. Harrigan, W. O. Cummings, and G. L. Putnam.

A meeting was held at the courthouse yesterday afternoon, to constitute the Stevens County Taxpayers League. Much discussion was given to high taxes, but nothing was done to determine how much cut ought to be made in the four main kinds of taxation, state, county, school, roads. Committees were ordered appointed to further the work of the league. This movement resulted from a gathering held at Rice some weeks ago. Most all of the candidates for county office were present at the meeting, but only a few of them were heard.

Brother Achilles Cafornio died of old age at the St. Francis Regis mission six miles northwest of Colville about 1:30 Friday morning. He has been gardener at the mission for the past 25 years. He died at the age of 88 years and 9 months, exactly 3 months before his 89th birthday. He was removed to the McCord Undertaking parlors. Funeral services will be at 8 this morning. Interment will be at St. Michaels, near Hillyard.

Mr. Ide is one of the pioneers and trail blazers not only of Stevens county but of the great northwest. He arrived in Washington in 1880 and came to Stevens county in 1885. From 1886 to 1890 he was territorial sheriff of Stevens, Pend Oreille, Ferry and Okanogan counties. Realizing the vast potential farming, mining and timber wealth of this section, immediately after arriving here Mr. Ide and some of the other early pioneers began opening up all parts of the county and making it possible for settlement. In 1886 he cut out a trail from the South fork of Mill creek to Deep creek which opened up all that part of Stevens county from Colville to the boundary line. In 1895 he cut a trail from Northport through the Sheep creek valley to Rossland, and in this manner connected Stevens county and eastern Washington with Canada and opened up the northern part of the county to settlers. To Mr. Ide belongs the credit of having built the first state highway in Washington. In 1892 the legislature made an appropriation for a highway from Whatcom to Marcus. He cruised the east half of that road from the mouth of what is now Deadman creek to Republic and also built the first 1 1/2 miles from Kettle River west.

Mr. Ide's principal vocation since

coming to Colville has been farming and stock raising. He has owned several of the largest farms in the Colville valley and for 28 consecutive years farmed 120 acres of land in the valley. He has also cleared and farmed some of the bench lands around Colville. In 1890 he introduced into the county the first purebred stock and has devoted a great deal of time and energy to the raising of purebred stock. Mr. Ide has also never lost faith in the mineral possibilities of this county.

Mr. Ide's long residence in the county, and his experience in highway and other county matters as well as his general experience, qualifies him for the office he seeks. He is a large taxpayer and the taxpayers' interests are naturally his interests. He is committed to a policy of economy and retrenchment, well knowing that the burden of taxation is becoming extremely oppressive, and only by cutting out and eliminating all unnecessary expenses of every kind and character, can taxes be reduced.
