### GIANT SKELETON IN ALASKA.

W. M. Alberti En Route North to Excavate Find.

Seattle.—William M. Alberti, of New York, who is interested in mining on Pennell creek, north of Nome, Alaska to have excavated the remains of an Elephas pal migenius, or a species of the giant mammoth many thousands of years extinct. He is commissioned to prepare the skeleton for shipment by the Smithsonian institution at Washington.

The frame of this, the largest of the known mammoths which once roamed at will in North America and other parts of the world, lies embedded in a gravel bank on Hanum river, a tributary to the Innetchuk river, not far from Nome. It was discovered last year by some miners, and reported to Mr. Alberti. While he was east, during the winter, he reported the find to the Smithsonian institution, and received his commission to have the skeleton shipped out, with the view of putting the members together and exhibiting the whole at the St. Louis fair.

When Mr. Alberti left the north, last fall, the specimen was in perfect condition, with not a bone or tusk missing. Since his arrival in Seattle he has been informed by persons who left the district after him that vandals have dug out one of the tusks, which measured eight feet in length, and that the skull has been broken in and some teeth extracted.

While regretting this very much, Mr. Alberti will nevertheless go to the spot, and unless the specimen has been destroyed he will remove it and try to secure from the persons taking the parts their return. In an interview, Mr. Alberti said:

"I regretted very much to learn that some persons had broken into the specimen. When I left the district, last year, I gave special instructions that it should not be touched.

"The frame lies in the side of a gravel bank. The rains have washed away the dirt which, for thousands of years, has been covering it, and the ribs, skull, tusks and other parts were bare and in perfect condition. It was as good a specimen as was ever found of any extinct animal.

"The part of the skeleton exposed is as large as an ordinary house. When I explained at the Smithsonian institution what I had the professors were very anxious to have it brought out intact and exhibited at St. Louis. I was given instructions as to how best to get it out and how to label the different parts, so that there would be no trouble in putting them together.

"This is the first specimen of the Elephas pal migenius ever found in America. Some years ago, there was a perfect specimen found in Russia. In life it had been overtaken in a snowstorm and was frozen stiff. For thousands of years it remained in the ice, until a change in the climatic conditions brought about a thaw and it was exposed. This is the only whole one that has ever been found in the world.

"Ten years ago there was a part of a frame found in Colorado. The institution sent out a party to excavate it and bring it to Washington, but before the party arrived vandals destroyed its beauty, and while it was taken out there were many parts missing.

"I am in hopes I shall be able to get the tusk and teeth from the persons who took them, and if this is possible little harm will have been done."

### TO VISIT SWISS ALPS.

Popular Pomeroy Priest Starts On a Long Vacation.

Pomeroy.—Rev. William Amschwand, perhaps the most talented and influential Catholic priest ever stationed here has left after a most successful ministry of four years at this place, to revisit his old home in the Swiss Alps.

Rev. Amschwand's work here has been productive of the most noticeable results. Under his care the Catholic membership has almost doubled in numbers, until now it is the strongest denomination in the county (Garfield), both numerically and financially. The Catholic school has, under his management, become a permanent institution, with an attendance of fifty the last semester. All the church property presents a fine appearance, the buildings having been largely remodeled and improved, while the grounds are well kept.

The Catholic charge here is accounted one of the most difficult owing to the heterogeneity of its nationalities and to the large variance in the languages spoken by the parishioners. In overcoming this obstacle, Rev. Amschwand has been singularly successful, and his achievements in this line are directly attributable to his proficiency as a linguist.

The departing priest, who is an enthusiastic believer in American methods, will visit points of interest in this country before sailing, and especially will make a study of the workings of the various government bureaus at Washington for the purpose of securing data for a series of lectures on American institutions he contemplates delivering in foreign tongues in the various countries of Europe through which his route lies. His tour will end with a journey to Rome and the Holy Land, his return being expected in September. His absence from educational circles will be felt by a host of friends even in Protestant denominations. A Benedictine father from Mount Angel, Ore., who is already here, is to officiate during Rev. Amschwand's vacation. Upon his return Rev. Amschwand will re-enter upon his work here, he having been chosen for this post again by the bishop.

### CHASED HALF AROUND WORLD.

Ed L. Waite, Fugitive From Manila, Finally Captured.

Seattle.—Deputy United States Marshal John Stringer has arrived in Seattle having under arrest Ed L. Waite, who is wanted in Manila for embezzlement.

Waite left Manila May 2, taking with him, it is alleged, \$9000 of the money of Col Newberry's bank, of which he was cashier. He was traced from the Philippines to Hongkong where he boarded the steamship Tartar for Vancouver, B. C., and the authorities at Washington were notified. Deputy Stringer went to Victoria to meet the boat Friday, and went on board, pretending to be an immigration inspector. He spotted his man all right, and officer and suspect both remained on the vessel until Vancouver was reached.

Waite left the ship there, and Mr. Stringer shadowed him, determined to arrest him the moment he set foot on American soil. Waite got away from him for a time Saturday, but Mr. Stringer watched all departing boats and trains, and was finally rewarded Saturday night by seeing his man step on board the Canadian Pacific train bound for Seattle.

It was supposed that the fugitive would start at once for the Atlantic coast, and Mr. Stringer was prepared to go on with him and arrest him as soon as he entered the United States. When he saw his man get on the train bound for Seattle, however, Mr. Stringer's task was greatly simplified. The officer boarded the baggage car while the suspected man rode in the sleeper. As soon as the international boundary line was crossed, however, Mr. Stringer went back to the sleeper and, touching his man on the shoulder informed him that he was under arrest.

Waite is a tall young man of fine appearance, and he put on a bold front and an injured air for a little while, but the determined air and business-like tone of the officer soon convinced him that attempt at evasion was useless, so he admitted that his name was Waite and that he had just come from Manila.

In fact, the prisoner admits everything except that he took the money. He says he worked in a bank in Manila and left there May 2, but he denies most emphatically that he is an embezzler.

Deputy Stringer thinks there can be no doubt of the identity of the man, and that he is the man wanted. He answers the description perfectly, and the fact that he was traced up to the time of getting on the Tartar at Hongkong, and the further fact that he saw him himself on board the boat, he thinks makes the chain complete.

### DIPLOMATS' VACATION.

Washington, D. C., June 3.—Sir Michael Herbert, the British ambassador, and his staff, leave today for Newport, where the embassy will be located for the summer. Sir Michael and Lady Herbert have arranged to sail for England later in the month and will not return until late in the summer. Herbert G. Dering, second secretary of the embassy, likewise will spend part of the summer in England.
