JOKE ON OFFICERS

Mistook Boys for Bold Cattle Thieves.

FRANKIE DOOLEY ONE VICTIM

Was Driving Mother's Cattle in From Starbuck When He Was Nailed by a Deputy Near Town.

A rather ludicrous error made by county officers a few days ago was brought to light when Frankie Dooley, aged 12 years, a son of the late John Dooley, and Fritz Shonlever, aged 16, employed by the Dooleys came into Walla Walla Monday evening and reported that they had been held up by Deputy Sheriff Kees at the point of a gun three miles east of the city on the supposition that they were cattle thieves. The boys were delegated by Mrs. Dooley to bring several cows with calves from Starbuck to Walla Walla and were leisurely making their way along the road when Deputy Kees and Deputy Gilliam drove up in a buggy.

Frankie Dooley says that Deputy Kees jumped from the rig, grabbed hold of his pony's bridle and drawing a revolver stuck it into his face with the command to throw up his hands. The revolver was switched into Shonlever's face with the same remark. Both boys scared nearly out of their senses at the sight of the gun hastily obeyed, while the deputy searched them for guns. Shonlever finally recovered speech sufficiently to inform the deputy who they were and whose cattle they were driving. Admitting that he had made a mistake, the deputy allowed the boys to move on.

A member of the Dooley family verified the boys' statements this morning and also stated that Frankie had been ill all Monday night as a result of the scare he had been subjected to. A dispatch to the sheriff's office Monday stated that two cows had been stolen from Dayton the day before and were supposed to have been driven in the direction of Walla Walla. The two deputies left Walla Walla that afternoon in an effort to get trace of the thieves, when young Dooley and Shonlever were run onto.

The exciting episode followed. Mr. Kees apologized to the boys and members of the family for the unintentional fright he had given the boys.

ORDINANCE NO. 839.
 An ordinance to grade and sidewalk North Eighth street from Elm to Rees Ave. streets, and creating an assessment district to pay therefor. The City of Walla Walla does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That North Eighth street, from its intersection of the center line of Elm street to its intersection of the center line of Moore street in the city of Walla Walla be graded to its full width and sidewalked on both sides in accordance with the plans and specifications furnished by the City Surveyor and approved by the Council.

Sec. 2. That to pay for said improvements, the following real estate is created into an assessment district, to-wit: All lots and parts of lots abutting on North Eighth street, between said points, to a depth of 60 feet.

Sec. 3. That the city assessor be and he is hereby authorized and directed to appraise the said real estate, exclusive of the improvements, within said district, and report to the council the value of each piece of real property and the amount of benefits it will receive from the making of said improvements.

Sec. 4. That the committee on streets and public improvements be, and it is hereby directed, upon the assessment of the property above described, as provided for in section "2" of this ordinance, to advertise for bids and let the whole or any part of said work to the lowest and best bidder.

Sec. 5. That when said assessment and report have been made and filed and adopted by the council, and all contracts for said improvement let, the cost of the same shall be by ordinance levied and assessed upon the lands included in said assessment district, in accordance with the benefits to be received to each lot or parcel of lands from said improvement, and such assessment and levy shall constitute and be a lien upon each parcel of land upon which the same is so levied, and shall be collected as in such ordinance provided.

Sec. 6. The contract or contracts awarded by virtue of this ordinance shall specify that the contract price is payable out of the fund to be collected from said assessment district and not otherwise, and each contractor shall give a bond for the faithful performance of said contract in accordance with the plans and specifications, and for the payment of all sums justly due to laborers, mechanics and material men and others who shall do or perform any work or labor thereon, or furnish any materials therefor, and for the protection of the traveling public therealong during the progress of said work.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication. Passed the council June 16, 1903.
