MISS ELLIOT'S REMAINS

Will Be Brought to Walla Walla for
Interment—Body Expected
Tomorrow.

The remains of Miss Maude Elliott of Walla Walla, who was visiting at Heppner and lost her life in the flood, will be returned to this city for interment. The body was shipped from Heppner last night and is expected to arrive here tomorrow morning. Miss Elliott's death is unusually sad. For several months prior to leaving Walla Walla she had taken care of three little orphan nephews and nieces, children of her dead sister. She left Walla Walla to go to Heppner to care for a brother-in-law who was ill with consumption. He with his wife and two children were also swept away in the flood.

Miss Elliott's father and two sisters are over on Salmon river and probably up to this time are unaware of

her death. Her other two sisters, Misses Josie and Arlette, are in the city to meet the body, which will be taken to Cookerly's undertaking parlors. The funeral will probably take place from there.

Nearly driven to distraction by the awful flood at Heppner which he learned of yesterday for the first time at Dayton, C. F. Royce, who has many relatives and friends in the ill-fated town, left for the scene this morning. D. V. Reed and family, relatives of Mr. Royce, reside at Heppner and he has heard nothing from them. He fears they are dead and also fears that his mother was visiting there at the time.


