**EVERETT NEWS NOTES.**

Everett.—William Clark, a man of middle age, was discovered in an attempt to burn the Odd Fellows' hall at Arlington. He had a blaze fairly started under the building when the discovery was made, but he made no attempt to escape, standing close by while passers-by stamped out the fire. When asked for an explanation he began a harangue on fraternal orders in general, saying he had formulated a plan by which all secret societies could be amalgamated and that there was no further use for so many lodge rooms. He has another hallucination that he is able to carry on a wireless telegraphic conversation with George Washington and other departed celebrities. Two deputies brought him to the county jail at Everett.

Another man with wheels, named John Sisk was picked up in Everett. He claims to have just completed a tour through Hades, and told a story of his adventures in the underworld that rivaled Dante's "Inferno." Sisk fell down a stairway several days ago and struck his head. The shock is thought to have brought on his affliction. He was taken to Providence hospital, Seattle for treatment.

William Hamilton, the young Snohomish man who contracted lockjaw from a wound inflicted by a toy pistol, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Alex. Evoy. Hamilton accidentally discharged the pistol about two weeks ago, and the wad was driven into the left hand. The member was badly swollen by the next morning and the wad was not entirely removed until three days later. The wound began to heal, but a few days after symptoms of lockjaw appeared and up to the time of his death Hamilton suffered extremely.

**SIGHT SEEING TOUR**  
Ex-Governor Eagle of Arkansas in City Visiting

ACCOMPANIED BY HIS BROTHER

Is Now President of Southern Baptist Association and One of Largest Cotton Growers in Arkansas.

On a sight seeing tour and to visit a cousin, A. M. Robinson, a prominent farmer residing four miles northwest of Walla Walla, Joseph P. Eagle, ex-governor of Arkansas, and brother W. H. Eagle, have arrived in Walla Walla. Miss Bessie, a daughter of W. H. Eagle is accompanying the party.

Ex-Governor Eagle is one of the most prominent and influential citizens of Arkansas, having been governor of the state from 1888 to 1892, and is one of the largest cotton growers of the state. He is at present president of the Southern Baptist association, a prominent and powerful religious organization. He also enjoys the title of general in addition to governor, having served through the civil war as a general in the Confederate army.

This is the ex-governor's first trip to the extreme west and today he said the magnificent resources apparent on every hand were a revelation to him. Cotton fields of magnitude are familiar objects to him, but the hundreds of thousands of acres of waving grain he has seen on his trip to Washington tend to bear out the statement he has oftentimes heard that Washington is one of the greatest wheat producing states in the Union.

The party will remain a few days visiting Mr. Robinson at his home and will then return to Arkansas by easy stages, stopping off at cities of importance enroute.

**NEW THEORY IS TABOOED.**

"Modern Dream of a Ready Dreamer," Says Prof. Richards.

Boston, July 2.—In an interview Professor T. W. Richards of the chemical department at Harvard expressed himself as skeptical about the new theory of the universe propounded recently in London by British scientists. He said:

"The new discovery which has been heralded in London as a discovery that would revolutionize science is but an interesting hypothesis, a modern dream of a ready dreamer. There is no doubt that this so-called radium is a new manifestation of energy in matter that tends to an amplification of the case concerning that of the discussed subject, but to say that it takes the place of matter, and that matter is a thing of the past, is a radical statement which the facts do not bear out. The facts concerning radium are the most important that have been brought out for 26 years, but no conclusion has been deduced to show that matter and electricity are one. It is one of the many hypotheses that can be drawn from the facts concerning this new substance, but there are many hypothesis that can be drawn from this same subject. This particular one may be correct, but that remains to be proved. This conclusion is like the one a man makes who has invested \$5 in stocks, with the expectation of getting \$1000,000. He might get the \$1000,000, but he could hardly say that he had it in his pocket. It is the same old difficulty over the words hypothesis and fact. Dreamers like Crookes and Lodge (for they have always been dreamers) are prone to jump at conclusions when they have hypotheses and a very weak hypothesis. They are not the world's foremost seekers after the ultimate secrets of the universe, but they are of the most radical group of scientists. They have no right to say from the facts in their possession that electricity and matter are one, nor can they state definitely how many ions there are in an atom. Such statements are not worthy of true scientists. One of the most important matters which is not mentioned in the report which has come from London is the temperature of this new substance. Radium is three degrees centigrade warmer than the other substances with which it comes in contact."
