## MID-WINTER CIRCUS

**A Splendid Performance Given Last Night**

**LEONDOR BROTHERS A FEATURE**

Trapeze, Horizontal Bar and Tumbling Acts Make Up an Excellent Program.

The midwinter circus by the Whitman college students and the Walla Walla band opened in Armory hall last night to a large audience. Every reserved seat in the house was occupied and the gallery was fairly well filled. The show went off without a hitch and the entertainment furnished was first class. The show was opened with a grand entry in which over 200 performers and the troupe of trained elephants participated. P. M. Winans had charge of the show and he made an excellent ringmaster.

There are many excellent features in the show and the audience greatly enjoyed the performance. John Lambert and his elephants made a big hit with the people, and gave a good imitation of the big animal act. The star act of the circus is given by the Leonador Brothers, a professional team from Portland. They give a fine exhibition of hand balancing and feats in tumbling, in fact their work is the equal of any of the regular circus performances. The McLean brothers do a trapeze act which is as good as that of many professional teams. The contortion act of Calder was exceptionally good and brought forth rounds of applause from the spectators. Morgan and Corpe do a turn on the horizontal and parallel bars that is first class, while Niles and Paxton give a good exhibition of bar work. Twenty clowns furnish the funny part of the program and the act alone is well worth the price of admission. Every nation in the world is represented by this bunch of merry makers. Their concerted topical song was one of the features of the evening. The pyramid team under the direction of Byron Lutcher gave a good performance. This team is composed of Lutcher, Perringer, Dutcher, Graham, Niles, Condit, John Lyman and James Lyman.

In keeping with the custom of the big circuses, a concert was given at the close of the ring performance. A good program of musical numbers by the boys and girls' glee clubs of the college, a solo by "Cy Simpkins" as "Rube," and an exceptionally good electric club swinging stunt by Libby made up the entertainment of this part of the show.

The peanut and lemonade vendors were in evidence and the entire event was given strictly along regular circus lines. The side show, in which many freaks are displayed, did a good business.

Tonight another performance will be given. The Walla Walla Military band will open the show with a concert of several numbers. The grand parade will be repeated, while a change will be made in the several acts.

One of the specialties for tonight's performance will be a boxing bout between four soldiers of the Ninth cavalry. In the concert Miss Florence Stratton, of Watsburg, will render a violin solo.




