TO BEAUTIFY THE GROUNDS COLLEGE CAMPUS AT THE STATE COLLEGE IS TO BE GREATLY IMPROVED

Excellent Exhibit Is Being Prepared For the Lewis and Clark Fair by the Students.

Special to Evening Statesman: PULLMAN, Wash., June 1.—Extensive plans are now progressing for beautifying the college campus. The work is under the direction of Professor Thornber, head of the department of horticulture. Professor Thornber is recently from Cornell university and is an expert in landscape work. Lawns and driveways are already in progress. When the new plans are completely carried out the college campus will present a most beautiful and imposing appearance.

Lewis and Clark Exhibit. The college is preparing an excellent exhibit for the Lewis and Clark exposition. One of the most unique and interesting things to be seen at the fair will be a relief map of the college campus and buildings. The map will be on the large scale of 25 feet to the inch, 12 feet long and 10 inches high. It will be an exact miniature of the college grounds and buildings, 1-300 part as large. It will be entirely the work of students under the work of college instructors—a home product in fact. The surveys and measurements are the work of engineering students. The relief work is being done under the supervision of Professor Sheed, one of the best relief map builders in the west. The buildings are the handiwork of the students in wood work, and are models of fine workmanship. Spring football practice has begun. Twenty men have already reported for practice. Everything indicates the best team and the most successful season in the history of the college, for next year.

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CROPS ARE MATURING FINE

WARM SUNSHINE FOLLOWING COPIOUS RAINS RESULTS IN MUCH GOOD

Crop Man of Agriculture Says That Vegetables and Berries Need Warmer Weather.

As a result of warm sunshine and growing weather for several consecutive days following the copious, but cool rains of the first two or three days of the week, crops have made decided advancement. In some localities the rains were heavy, especially in the San Juan and Whidby islands, where it was greatly needed.

West of the Cascade mountains oats, potatoes, meadows, and pastures have been greatly improved, while in the eastern counties wheat, oats, barley, and gardens have received decided benefit. Both winter and spring wheat are reported in a very promising condition. The former is heading slowly, and some is in bloom in Klickitat county. In the southern counties alfalfa cutting is in progress, and the strawberry season is at its height. The berry crop has been considerably lessened by frosts. In the western counties the strawberries are beginning to ripen.

In many localities it is found that the frosts of the previous week greatly damaged fruit, such as cherries, plums and prunes, and in some cases apples, and lessened the crop as much as one-half. Gardens have begun to grow rapidly since the warm weather. Potatoes are thrifty, though somewhat weedy. Those replanted on account of the seed rotting or cutting down by frost, are coming up well. Hops have been making slow progress. There are many reports of missing hills.

Spokane County.
 Hazard—All crops in splendid condition. Mead—Early grain shows effect of frost. Winter wheat looking well. Garden truck growing slowly.

Stevens County
 Cedonia—Crops are looking well. Loon Lake—Good growing weather. Grass and grain looking well. Garden truck growing slowly.

Big Bend Country.
 Almira—Gardens and crops growing slowly. Crescent—No cherries nor peaches. There are a few apples. The crops are fair considering the frost and cold weather. Reardon—Crops are growing slowly. Tippo—Crops in fine condition. Frost did but little damage. Waukon—Rain helped the crops very much. Barry—Fine growing weather for grain. Fine prospects for hay, grain and fruit crops. Cherries are ripening. St. Andrew—Frost of the previous week damaged wheat in some places.

Palouse Country.
 Colfax—Grain in excellent condition. Fruit prospects better than indicated in previous reports. Gardens backward. Colton—There will be no cherries and but few prunes or plums. The grain benefited by the late rain. Pullman—Squirrels are very destructive. Rosalia—Fall wheat doing finely. The spring wheat fairly well. Fruit less than half a crop. St. John—Grain crop looks well. Gardens only fair owing to frost. There will be a light crop of fruit. Tekoa—Condition and prospects of crops good. Fletcher—Spring wheat fine. Gardens are late. About half a crop of fruit of all kinds. Hatton—All grain doing well considering cold weather. Lind—Crop prospects very little changed during the week.

Walla Walla Country.
 Walla Walla District—Weather favorable for wheat. Vegetables and berries need warmer weather and sunshine. Wheat has made good growth. Dayton—Good growing weather. The grain looking fine. Clarkston—Crops are growing fast.

HUNGRY MOB BEGGING BREAD.
 Starving Spaniards Invade Malaga—Many Fall in Streets

MADRID, June 1.—Three thousand starving persons from neighboring villages have invaded Malaga, asking for bread or work. They are headed by landowners, who were lately prosperous, but are now poor as the most poverty-stricken peasants. The procession assembled in front of the prefecture, and the mob appealed to the prefect, who declared he was unable to help them. He forbade them to beg and urged them to return to their homes. The leaders pleaded that to return meant death from starvation. Many of them taking part in the procession dropped in the streets from exhaustion. The prefect did not enforce his order against begging. The leaders visited a large number of houses asking assistance.

SAFE TRIP DOWN THE RIVER

STEAMER J. M. HANNAFORD MAKES RUN FROM LEWISTON TO OLD AINSWORTH.

Wheel Dashed to Pieces in Swift Palouse Rapids—Trip Made in Nine Hours Actual Running.

The steamer J. M. Hannaford, which will be used for carrying material for the new Northern Pacific bridge across the Columbia at Pasco, was brought down the river Tuesday from Lewiston by Captain W. P. Gray. Captain Gray states that the trip down the Snake was made without accident and with only few delays. The Hannaford left Lewiston Monday evening at 4:05 and made a straight run to Riparia where a few minutes was lost in passing under the bridge at that point. No trouble was experienced in shooting the rapids below Riparia but after passing through the swift Palouse rapids near Lyons' ferry a stop of five hours was necessary in order to repair the wheel which was defective and was badly wrenched and broken by the terrific swirl of the rapids. After repairs had been made the Hannaford proceeded on her way to old Ainsworth where she arrived safely. The trip from Lewiston to Ainsworth was made in a trifle over nine hours actual running time.

Captain Edwards and George S. Fuller, government inspectors, Messrs. White and Ham, of Spokane, and Eben Mounce of Lewiston, made the trip on the Hannaford and were met with a launch at Ainsworth and conveyed to Kennewick, where the inspectors will inspect the steamer Jerome and the other members of the party will view a current motor now in operation. Captain Gray states the river can easily be navigated at all seasons with the steamer Mountain Gem, and predicts a most enjoyable trip to Celilo on the occasion of the opening of the portage road.
