WATER SPOUT NEAR CLYDE

HIGH WALL OF WATER SWEPT DOWN WALKER CANYON LATE LAST NIGHT.

Tracks of Snake River Road Covered With Rock and Sand—Trains Come Around by Walla Walla.

Reports of a disastrous waterspout in Walker canyon, the other side of Clyde station on Eureka Flat, reached Walla Walla this morning. While the details are meager, it is reported that a cloudburst occurred at the head of the canyon just before dark yesterday evening. A huge wall of water, described as several feet in height, rushed down the narrow canyon, carrying away fences and doing considerable damage to crops along the bottom. A large amount of rock and debris was carried over the tracks of the Snake River Valley railroad necessitating the Portland and Spokane trains, No. 3 and No. 4, coming around by the way of Walla Walla to reach their destinations.

A section crew was sent out from Wallula this morning to clear the tracks and repair the damage. Rock and sand covers the track to a depth of several feet and it will probably take a day or so to clear the road so that traffic may be resumed.

Walker canyon is a desolate defile in the breaks of Snake river and is thinly settled, there being but two or three farm houses along its entire course. The houses are fortunately situated high above the bottom and escaped the flood of water which came down the canyon.

STREET CAR SYSTEM ASSURED WORK IS TO START AT ONCE

Walla Walla Valley Traction Company Perfects Organization and Authorizes Purchase of Material—I. W. Anderson New President

Another step toward fulfilling the promise made by Isaac W. Anderson that he would build a street car system in Walla Walla was taken at a meeting of the Walla Walla Valley Traction company held at the offices of the Northwestern Gas & Electric company last night when organization was perfected, officers and directors elected and Isaac W. Anderson, the newly elected president, was authorized to close contracts for ties, rails and street car material and also to employ engineers to survey out the line within the business and residence districts. Work to Start at Once.

It was learned from good authority today that engineers will be put to work within the next three days surveying out the new line and that the track will be completed within the business district before the pavement in East Main and East Alder is laid. In order to do this it will be necessary for the new company to rush material into Walla Walla within the next 30 days and begin the work of laying track. That this will be done was evidenced by the fact that President Anderson was given authority to close contracts for material for immediate delivery. The probable route of the new line has not been made public yet nor will it be until a complete survey of the city has been made and a report made to the directors. Whether Alder or Main street or both is to secure a line is a matter of considerable interest to property owners on these two streets.

WANT WONG LONG IN JAIL

Officers Will See That He Is Moved to Safe Quarters as Soon as Able.


Birthday of Princess Yolande.
