MEETS A HORRIBLE DEATH

G. R. BAYNE OF HELIX DRAGGED TO DEATH BY HIS TEAM YESTERDAY.

Body Was Found Thumping up and Down Under Wheel as Team Trotted Along the Road.

HELIX, Sept. 13.—G. R. Bayne was dragged to death yesterday morning while driving from Adams to Helix. Mr. Bayne drove over to Adams Monday night to visit his brother, who is in the grocery store at that place. Yesterday morning he started back to Helix. He took some wire along, intending to repair the barb wire telephone line on his way back to Helix. He was seen to stop once and make some repairs where the wire had become detached from the fence. About a mile and a half from what is known as the horseshoe bend, not far from Barger's place, one of the Gerking boys, who was hauling grain, saw a team along the road with what seemed to be a large object hanging against one wheel and dragging along the road. When he came up he was horrified to find that it was the body of a man. Almost every bone was broken and his head fearfully mutilated. It is supposed that he got out of the buggy to repair the phone line, when the team became frightened and started to run. He had on a heavy ulster which caught in the hub and as the wheel revolved around tightly drawing his body up close to the wheel with his head hanging down upon the ground. He is a relative of D. B. Richardson, in whose general merchandise store he worked for a year or more. His parents reside in Canada. He was very popular in Helix and his death is sincerely regretted.

NEW BOUNDARIES FORMED

CITY SUPT. JONES AND COUNTY SUPT. BOND REDISTRIC CITY.

Made Necessary by Erection of New Park Street School—Five Districts Now Instead of Four.

Prof. O. S. Jones, superintendent of the city schools and County School Superintendent G. S. Bond have finished redistricting Walla Walla, made necessary by the construction of the new Green Park school. Instead of four districts Walla Walla now has five, the boundaries of which are as follows:

Sharpstein district—Beginning at a point where Park street crosses Mill creek; thence easterly along Mill creek to Clinton street; south on Clinton to Lincoln; east on Lincoln and Lincoln produced to the eastern boundary of the school district; southerly along said line to the south line of the district; westerly along said line to a point where Park avenue produced would intersect said south line; thence north on Park avenue produced and Park avenue to Bryant avenue; along Bryant avenue and Catherine street to Locust street; Locust and First to Birch; Birch to Palouse; Palouse to Alder; Alder to Park; Park to starting point.

Baker District—Beginning at the intersection of Fifth and Poplar; north on Fifth street and Fifth street north to north Fourth street; along north Fourth street and Fourth street produced to north line of school district; east along said north line to a point where College avenue produced and College avenue to Boyer avenue; along Boyer avenue to Park street; south on Park to Alder; thence to Palouse; thence to Birch; along Birch to First avenue to Poplar; west on Poplar to point of beginning.

Green Park District All that portion of School District No. 1 north of the Sharpstein and east of the Baker districts.

Washington district—All that part of school district No. 1 west of the

Baker district and north of Birch street and Birch street produced. Lincoln district—All that portion of school district No. 1 west of the Sharpstein district and south of the Baker and Washington districts.
