CHILD LABOR LAW IS MUCH CHANGED

PROHIBITS THE EMPLOYMENT OF CHILDREN IN DANGEROUS OCCUPATIONS.

Girls Under Sixteen May Not Be Employed Where Work Requires Them to Remain Standing.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Important changes are made in the new child labor law which went into effect in this state today, and affects dangerous employment greatly.

The law prohibits the employment of children under sixteen years of age in the operation of certain forms of

machinery, such as circular saws, planers, pickers, printing presses operated by motive power other than foot; stamping machines, rolling-mill machinery, and laundering machinery.

It also prohibits the employment of children in adjusting any belt to machinery, in the preparation of any composition in which poisonous acids are used, in the packing of matches, in the manufacture of powder, or in any place where alcoholic liquors are manufactured or bottled.

Girls under the age of sixteen shall not be employed in any capacity where such employment compels them to remain standing constantly.

No child under sixteen shall be permitted to manage or operate an elevator, either for freight or passengers.

LAW PROVES ITS WORTH

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 1.—The bank guarantee law was given a severe test when thousands of dollars were paid to the depositors of the suspended Columbia bank from the funds of the state banking board. Financiers are today declaring the law has proved its worth. Today the directors of the institution submitted a proposition looking forward to the reopening of the bank.

SPANIARDS SET BACK

MADRID, Oct. 1.—News of the death of General Vicaris and the destruction of his advance column is being kept from the populace here for fear of an outbreak. The retreat of a thousand Spaniards from Mount Gurgura which is a vantage point, is also suppressed. General Weyler has notified the king that he is prepared to become military dictator of this city if the government will give the word. A revolution is believed to be brewing. Bomb outrages in the principal cities occur almost daily and a number of cities are filled with posters threatening the king's life. The military is powerless against the brigands who are swarming the country.

MELLILA, Oct. 1.—The Spaniards received a serious setback in an effort to subdue the Rif tribesmen in Morocco and 200 Spaniards were annihilated.

The Spaniards, entrapped by the wily Moors, were convinced that the rebellion was practically over, and did not expect an attack. The Spaniards killed were recommissioning in advance of the main column, and were cut to pieces before the main body could come to the rescue.

RATE CASE

SPOKANE, Oct. 1.—This city continued the presentation of its case here today before Interstate Commerce Commission Prouty in an effort to show that the cities of eastern Washington are discriminated against in favor of coast points by the railroads. It was represented that instances are found where merchants found it cheaper to ship to the coast and pay freight back than to ship to Spokane direct from the east, under the Spokane rate. Prouty declared the railroads should change the rates on mixed carload lots canned vegetables and fish unless it was made to remove discrimination against the coast points.

Derby day has always been an event of some consequence and this year it is expected that the attendance will exceed that of any other day. The fair association has set aside next Thursday as the day on which the Derby day events will take place this year.

PROF. HEWITT, ARCHAEOLOGIST WILL SPEAK SATURDAY EVE

Lecture in Whitman Memorial Chapel to Be Illustrated by Stereopticon Views.

What promises to be one of the most interesting lectures ever delivered in Walla Walla is that which is to be given in the Whitman Memorial building tomorrow evening by Professor Edgar E. Hewitt. Professor Hewitt's lecture will be under the auspices of the Walla Walla branch of the American Institute of Archaeology, and will be concerning recent excavations which have been made in Southern California, Arizona, and Mexico. Prof. Hewitt has some interesting data concerning the cliff dwellers and other pre-historic peoples and his lecture upon them should be extremely interesting. Every few months the American Institute of Archaeology sends lecturers to the different branches of the institute to lecture with stereopticon views of the progress which is being made in archaeological work both in the old world and in America. These lectures are always open to the public and it is hoped that a large number of citizens of Walla Walla will be out tomorrow evening to hear Dr. Hewitt and learn of the great work which is being done to study pre-historic conditions in America.
