AMONG THE ISLANDS

Randall and Cross Favor The Tribune With a Letter

IN CAMP ON ORCAS ISLAND. TO THE LYNDEN TRIBUNE:— July 29. Everything is lovely, and the goose hangs high—just out of reach. However the saloon are in each and I want to say that it takes a pretty good sized one to satisfy our carnivorous appetites, even for one meal. I think I hear some of the readers of the Tribune saying, "That's a fish story." They are certainly right, it is fish I am writing about. We are catching some very fine salmon now-a-days.

Tuesday afternoon the Baldwin and Axlings families, Miss Plank and your humble correspondent took a trip in the sloop Delta B. to Mattie Island. The island is a Government Light-house Reserve but an old batch by the name of Smith resides there. The island contains about 40 acres, the most of which is covered with brush and woods, however he keeps a nice flock of sheep and has a small garden. Miss Plank took a snapshot of the old man sitting in front of his shack, perhaps you have heard of the old saying, "As deaf as a bat," I would judge him to be as deaf as all the bats banded together.

We got back to camp about supper time and I want to tell you, that the grub suffered.

Yesterday morning the Baldwins and Axlings and Miss Plank stowed "Their Buffle" aboard the Delta B., pulled anchor and started westward around Orcas Island. If all goes well, they hope to be back to our camp by Aug. first.

Thursday, July 30.—All is O. K. camp today as usual, however the wind is keeping up quite a just on the water. So much so, in fact, that small crafts had better keep their weather eye open. The mail must have miscarried, for I mailed the correspondence in time to get in the paper each week. We get the Tribune regularly and are glad to note the improvement. There don't seem to be any many boats in sight today, however—looking over the Bay—I do see a large barge making her way northward. We have neighbors both east and west of us. West of us one mile are three tents of campers from Fernale, and east of us are two camps of Swish Indians, hunting and fishing.

There sounds the "Hurrah" for dinner! Board here is \$2.00 per day, which includes the soft side of the gravelly beach to sleep on and all the Bay water you want to bathe in.

Friday, July 31. We are happy today as we took a trip to Twin Islands this morning and returned with a good supply of clams. Now we can take our choice of boiled clams, fried clams, clam soup or just common every day clams. Come over Mr. Editor and get a good square meal of clams. If you want roast clams, we will allow you to roast them, provided, you cut your own wood, see

We will take a trip up the Sound this evening for the mail, and I hope we will not be disappointed. Well I suppose, today is the great day in Lynden! We want you to take in some of the sights for us, if you get more than you want for yourselves.

Saturday, Aug. 1. The Delta B. returned on schedule time this afternoon about 5 P. M. with all on board well and happy. On their trip around Orcas Island, they stepped at Olga and, after landing, all climbed up old Mt. Constitution. From its summit they had an excellent view of the Sound and say they were well repaid for the labor done in climbing.

They report a very pleasant journey around the island.

Sunday, Aug. 2. Today being Sunday it was spent in strolling along the sea-shore, gathering shells and visiting. For dinner we had a clam-bake. During the day we have seen three large steamers and many small crafts on the sound.

Monday, Aug. 3. The wind was hard this morning so the Baldwin and Axlings party did not get away quite as early as they intended.

However at noon, as the wind and sea were calmed considerably, they pulled anchor and stood away for Birch Bay. They will probably reach Birch Bay before night-fall, when Mr. Axlings will take a bike and go home after his team to haul them and the boat home.

If you could look across the Bay from Lynden, you would see two old "Duffers" at their camp this evening; but just the same, we are monarchs of all we survey,—see? Again we say good-bye. Ever respectfully yours, RANDALL & CROSS.
