THE pros and cons of township government are now being discussed by most of the papers and really it seems to be a very one sided affair. Township government is exercised in all the older states and is bound to come here, and may that time come soon.

WITH the establishment of Sunday mail service, Lynden will have a mail service second to none in the county. Letters mailed Saturday afternoon will now leave on Sunday morning instead of laying in the office till Monday morning. The petition asking for Sunday service was circulated by Mr. Green and was signed by over one hundred patrons. The matter was at once taken up by Postmaster O'Neil with the postoffice department with the above result.

THE country newspapers are continually receiving copy from various sources with the request, "Please publish free of charge, as no appropriation has been made for this part of the work." Now all departments of the government as well as other organizations realize the value of certain publications in the rural papers and isn't it about time they were reminded that appropriations are needed for "this part of the work." The recent primaries clearly demonstrated the power and value of the country papers, and the results, taken as a whole, was a grand victory for the rural press throughout the state. The country editor, as a general thing, is not an overpaid individual, and we don't understand he should be called upon to donate his services while others receive pay for theirs.
