### The Best Way.

Asked to give directions as to the best way to pasteurize separated cream without injuring its churning qualities Professor A. B. Nystron of the Pullman State College answered:

"There is two ways of pasteurizing milk or cream, by the flash or continuous process and by the holding or retarding process. The latter is to be preferred because it is not necessary to maintain a very high temperature to get effective results.

"If you are making a large amount of butter, say 100 pounds or more at a churning, it would be advisable to get a regular pasteurizing machine such as is put out by the various dairy machinery companies, but for small amounts of cream, heating in a common 10-gallon milk can by setting it in hot water, stirring both water and cream slowly, but continuously will be found to be very satisfactory."

He then gave the following table as showing the temperature to which cream should be raised for the respective time for effective pasteurization.

158 F. . . . . for 3 minutes.  
155 F. . . . . for 5 minutes.  
152 F. . . . . for 10 minutes.  
148 F. . . . . for 15 minutes.  
145 F. . . . . for 18 minutes.  
140 F. . . . . for 20 minutes.
