Wanted: A Taxpayers' League.

Many communities in Western Washington are organizing taxpayers' leagues, with "lower taxes" as their slogan. Organizations of this kind have great possibilities for good if properly conducted, and made and kept thoroughly non-political. Whatcom County is in need of just such an organization.

The officials of the National Home-Society claim that the good work of the society could be greatly increased by increased membership. It can hardly be denied that if the man who abuses his horses or other animal realizes that the watchful eyes of many men and women are on the lookout for him, he will more quickly cease his brutality. Just so with the average legislator, county commissioner, judge or other public servant. If he understands that his official acts are being noted and checked up, he will be more careful how he attends to the duties of his office. A taxpayers' league might be a very good thing.

Chehalis county is organizing such

a league with 800 members. Let us have one in Whatcom county; taxes are higher here than in Chehalis.

At Bellingham next Monday Night

The first gun in an aggressive campaign in Whatcom county on the part of the State Central Committee of the Progressive party, will be fired at Bellingham next Monday evening, when the Hon. Bainbridge Colby will deliver an address at Woodman hall.

Mr. Colby is a speaker of genuine oratorical ability, combining force and vigor with elegance of diction, and he ably presents the Progressive doctrine. He is one of New York's foremost citizens, and in the last campaign withdrew from the race for the nomination for governor in favor of Oscar Strauss, the present treasurer of the National Progressive Committee. 
